PROCESSED FOODS-Book 4 blue stamps, 10 points, A8 through Z8 and A5 through F5 valid indefinitely. bute stamps, 10 points, As through 2S and A5 through F5 valid indefinitely. NOTE – New red and blue stamps will become valid on or about the first of each month. SUGAR-Book 4 stamps 30, 31 and 32 valid indefinitely for five pounds cach, stamp 40 good for five pounds for home can-ning through Feb. 28, 1945. Stamp 33 good for five pounds Sept. 1. Obtain application for addi-tional canning sugar at local OPA boards. Application, when filled out, must be accompanied by spare stamp 37. Applicants may request up to 20 pounds per ration book. 
