Save Your Grease And Keep the Plumber Away

Wary of snaking accumulated grease out of thousands of Southern drain pipes, harassed local plumbers today offered a helpful wartime tip to housewives.

John F. Sullivan, business manager of the Merchant Plumbers' Association of Los Angeles, said housewives could easily cut household upkeep costs by transferring every drop of surplus grease directly from skillet to the salvage can, instead of pouring it down the sink. Then wipe the greasy skillet clean with a piece of paper.

Zack J. Farmer, WPB salvage chief for Southern California, added, "If the need of our fighting men for war materials made from salvaged fats isn't sufficient motive, if the payment of 4 cents plus two red ration points for each pound delivered to a meat dealer isn't enough of a spur to action, maybe Sullivan's tip on how money and trouble can be saved will finally get those fats to where they are needed."

Native Sons' Head Not Surprised At Jap Verdict

Walter H. Odemar, grand third vice president of the Native Sons of the Golden West, and chairman of the committee on Japanese legislation of that organization, today said he was not at all surprised at the verdict returned by a United States District Court jury which found three Japanese American sisters, formerly of Inglewood, guilty of conspiracy to commit treason in helping two German prisoners escape.

Odemar said "The action of these three American born Japanese women demonstrates the truth of the position taken by those on the Pacific Coast who are opposed to the return to this area of any person of Japanese ancestry during the war. Anyone who is familiar with the doctrines taught these Japanese both in America and in Japan, in their Japanese language schools, churches and in the home is not surprised at their disloyalty to the United States. The action of these convicted women again demonstrates that blood is really the tie that binds."

TORRANCE LEADERS COME TO FRONT WITH VOLUNTARY AID IN '44 WAR CHEST CAMPAIGN

Additional Torrance leaders have come forward to share in the work of organizing for the coming War Chest campaign, it is announced by Hillman Lee, chairman, and are mustering the "short-term" volunteers who will be required.

Now enlisted as vice chairmen are the following: Wallace Post, president of Torrance National Bank, who will direct solicitation in business houses having more than 25 employees; James L. Lynch, president of the Chamber of Commerce, who will be in charge of business districts; George L. Johnson of the Bank of America, who will head volunteers in the special gifts division of donors of larger amounts.

Colonels enrolled are: R. R. Smith, National Supply Co., for war plants; Mr. Lynch; W. E. Bowen, manager of Building and Loan Association, and Harry B. Lewis, executive secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

Lewis, who also is serving as the district chairman for the War Chest speakers bureau in Torrance, and Post, however, will now attend the special instruction meeting which will take place next Tuesday evening at 7:45 in the Wilshire Methodist church, Wilshire and Plymouth blvds. in Los Angeles. Handbooks and informative material will be distributed then.

The location was selected by agreement of district chairmen and the general bureau co-chairmen, Ralph Jim Reynolds and Dr. W. Ballentine Henley, as the place most readily reached by volunteer speakers who will assemble from San Fernando Valley, East Los Angeles, Bay districts, the Harbor, Huntington Park and other southeast communities, and join between 7 and 8 o'clock for the joint meeting. Reynolds emphasized its importance. "An uninformed speaker," he declared, "no matter how willing, cannot give the help needed."

"The War Chest story of dramatic need and practical service is tremendous," Mr. Reynolds said. "The success of the appeal for 133 great organizations will affect the lives of millions of men, women and children."

"We will be spokesmen for our own communities for our men and women in the armed forces and the merchant marine in combat zones, in prison camps, in hospitals and training camps; for the Allied nations whose people continue to live in pitiful suffering; for our own growing boys and girls, and our neighbors."

RATION FACTS

MEATS, CHEESES, CANNED MILK—Book 4 red stamps, 10 points, A8 through Z8 and A5 through D5 valid indefinitely.

PROCESSED FOODS—Book 4 blue stamps, 10 points, A8 through Z8 and A5 through F5 valid indefinitely.

NOTE—New red and blue stamps will become valid on or about the first of each month.

SUGAR—Book 4 stamps 30, 31 and 32 valid indefinitely for five pounds each, stamp 40 good for five pounds for home canning through Feb. 28, 1945. Stamp 33 good for five pounds Sept. 1.

Obtain application for additional canning sugar at local OPA boards. Application, when filled out, must be accompanied by spare stamp 37. Applicants may request up to 20 pounds per ration book. Second period applications may be filed to Oct. 20.

Ask your local OPA board for your consumer meat and grocery price lists.

SHOES—Book 3 airplane stamps 1 and 2 good indefinitely. **NOTE:** Take book along to make purchase.

GASOLINE—A12 coupons good for three gallons to Sept. 21. B2, B3, C2 and C3 coupons good for five gallons.

Save your tire inspection records. They must be presented when applying for a renewal of gas rations. Any request to replace any passenger car tire must be accompanied by an inspection record and a new notation from an authorized inspector that a new tire is needed.

Truck tire (T-Book drivers)—Every six months or every 5,000 miles.
