## Postoffice Rules for Overseas **Christmas Mailing are Given**

"Save strong string and box material and start to plan shopping," Postmaster C. Earl Conner advises Torrance residents in announcing the runs for mailing of Christmas gifts for Army and Navy personnel over-

This year the Christmas mailing period for both Army and Navy overseas forces is the same—Sept. 15 to Oct. 15. After Oct. 15 no gift pareel may be mailed to a soldier without the presentation of a written request from him.

The great demands upon shipping and the need for giving preference to arms, munitions, medicine and food is the prime reason for the early mailing date. Moreover, gift parcels must travel great distances to reach Army and Navy personnel who are located at remote points and frequently the transfer of large numbers to new stations necessitates forwarding of the packages and additional time is required.

"The response that the people made last year during the overseas mailing period demonstrated that they will cooperate in any measure designed for the welfare of our armed forces personnel," Conner said. "It is not easy to concentrate on Christmas gifts in the midst of warm weather here at home but our people recognized the need and because they want the men and women who are absent from their homes to know that they are not forgotten at Christmas they took pains to assure prompt delivery of Christmas gifts."

More care must be taken in wrapping and packing parcels securely and addressing them

If the gifts are to be protected in transit they must be packed in boxes made of metal, wood, solid fiberboard or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard, reinforced with strong gummed paper or tied with strong twine. If both tape and strong twine are used, so much the better. If the outer wrapper is crushed—and this is likely to happen—the loss of contents may be prevented if fiberboard boxes are wrapped in heavy paper.

Christmas gifts mean much to our people overseas. The parcel must not exceed five pounds, and must not be more than 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. It should be marked "Christmas parcel" so that it may be given special attention to assure its arrival before Dec. 25.

Not more than one parcel may be mailed in any one week to the same member of the armed forces by or in behalf of the same mailer.

When combination packages are made up of such items as miscellaneous toilet articles, hard candies, soaps, etc., the contents should be tightly packed so that they will not become loosened in transit and damage the contents or the cover. Hard candies, nuts, caramels (including those covered with chocolate), cookies, fruit cake, and chocolate bars individually wrapped in waxed paper should be enclosed in inner boxes of wood, metal or cardboard.

Perishable goods, such as fruits and vegetables that may spoil, are prohibited. Intoxicants, inflammable materials such as matches or lighter fluids, poisons and anything that might damage other mail also are prohibited. Gifts enclosed in glass should be substantially packed to avoid breakage. Sharp instruments, such as razors and knives, must have their edges and points protected so that they cannot cut through the coverings and injure postal personnel or damage other pack-

ages.

Relatives and friends who know that the personnel in the armed services to whom they plan to send gifts are at far distant points should begin to mail their packages on the opening day—Sept. 15—of the mailing

### Dove Season Opens on September 1

Dove season opens in California Sept. 1 and closes Oct. 12, with the exception of Imperial county, where the season opens Sept. 15. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Bag and possession limit, ten mourning doves per day. Only a shotgun not larger than 10 gauge, fired from the shoulder, may be used, capable of holding not more than three shells at one time.

Los Angeles county — Doves plentiful around outer sections of Arcadia and Monrovia.

Orange county — Opening of dove season will be fair in all grain and foothill areas throughout this county.
