

Out-of-State Service Men Not Subject to Tax

Service men from outside California but residing temporarily in the state because of military orders were reminded today by the Eleventh Naval District legal office that any personal property they may have with them is not subject to a California tax, but that an affidavit of exemption probably will be required.

An amendment to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief Act was enacted by Congress in July providing that where service personnel are stationed by reason of military orders in a state other than that of their permanent residence, the state where they are stationed, or any political subdivision thereof, cannot levy a tax upon the personal property at their temporary residence.

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Motorists Asked To Speed Filing 'A' Applications

First application forms for the new "A" book basic gasoline rations are being issued to motorists, but their return to the Torrance Ration Board is so slow that a clerical jam is anticipated when the rush starts, F. W. Daniels, chief clerk, declared yesterday. He asked motorists not to delay filing applications.

Applicants should study the application forms carefully, he said, to avoid omitting any essential information which would necessitate returning the blank and so delaying issuance of the new books.

The new book, providing the same amount of "A" book mileage as in the past, will contain coupons first valid for use on Sept. 22.

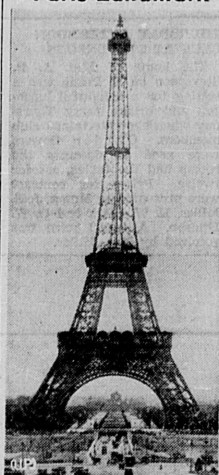

Traffic Toll In California Shows Some Reduction

Maintaining the downward barely noticeable last March, California six-month traffic fatality figures as of June this year established a definite saving of human life when compared to the motor vehicle toll during the same period in 1943. A recent analysis of traffic fatality data, made by the public safety department of the Automobile Club of Southern California, reveals that the trend first became evident at the close of the first quarter of 1944 when a 7 per cent drop over comparable 1943 fatality figures appeared.

Although four-month statistics reversed this slight improvement showing a 3 per cent increase against 1943 data, the downward trend was again established by 1944 five-month fatality statistics which showed a 3 per cent decrease. At the close of last June, the drop in the 1944 motor vehicle toll was still more definite as evidenced by six months' fatalities data which established an 8 per cent decrease under 1943 comparable figures.

Income Tax Bills For Third Quarter Are Put In Mail

More than 250,000 bills were mailed Aug. 25 by Collector of Internal Revenue Harry C. Westover to Southern Californians to cover outstanding balances of their 1944 federal income taxes.

"Third quarterly installment payments must be made by Sept. 15," Westover stated, "but the bills reflect the entire tax still due, and taxpayers may elect to pay only one-half of the bill now and the remaining half by Dec. 15."

"Also due by Sept. 15 are revised or amended declarations of estimated 1944 tax in all cases where taxpayers ascertain that their original estimates were too low."

"Payments may be made by personal check and should be sent to the closest revenue branch office where assistance will also be given on amended estimates," Westover stated.

Ice Cream of Greater Richness May Now be Made

Recent modification of War Food Order No. 8 is making it possible for ice cream manufacturers to use more non-fat milk solids in ice cream. Previously the manufacturer could only use 80% as much non-fat solids as he used of butterfat.

In other words, for each 10 pounds of butterfat he could use only 8 pounds of non-fat milk solids. Now he can use as much as 22% of milk solids in his ice cream, which means that if he makes ice cream containing 10% of fat he may use 12% of non-fat solids instead of 8% as formerly.

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Butter Ration Points Will Remain at 16

A ration value of 16 red points per pound, for creamery butter is to be maintained when point values for September become effective next Sunday, the Office of Price Administration announced today.

On Aug. 22, when the September point value charts went to the printer, it was indicated that a value of 20 red points per pound would have to be established, and a value of 20 red points per pound for creamery butter was printed upon the charts which will be posted in food stores next month.

Since Aug. 22, however, later information as to sales of creamery butter to consumers has become available to OPA. These later reports indicate that consumption will not exceed the allocation of 95,000,000 pounds for the month of September received from the War Food Administration if the present ration value of 16 red points per pound is maintained.

Because the point charts already have been printed, retail stores will be notified by OPA that the present point value of 16 red points per pound is to be continued in September and that a slip of paper bearing the figure "16" should be pasted over the "20" figure on the point value charts opposite the words "creamery butter."

Torrance to be Represented at Youth Parley

Torrance civic groups are expected to send many official delegates to the second Conference on Childhood and Youth in Wartime, according to Olin Wellborn, III, chairman of the conference continuing committee, who stated that several hundred representatives already have been appointed to attend the day's planning sessions which are scheduled for Monday, Sept. 25, at the Los Angeles Ambassador Hotel.

The September meeting will review the work accomplished since the first conference of two years ago when an over-all plan was set up for the care of children in this area. Delegates also will be asked to lay plans for looking to current unmet needs of children, and to prepare to anticipate as far as possible post-war problems which will affect them, Wellborn said.

"In a community where the forces of war affect youth more profoundly than in many American cities," he said, "it is time to study and review present wartime needs of children while looking to the transition period from war to peace. This community should not longer delay consideration of postwar plans for child welfare services."

Business, industrial and labor groups, churches, schools, public and private social agencies, men's and women's clubs have been asked to send delegates to the conference to aid in additional over-all plans for children. Other groups wishing representation should appoint members by Sept. 5, if possible, Wellborn said.

The conference on the 25th will begin with an 8:30 breakfast meeting, sessions will continue throughout the day, with the final program at 7:30 p.m.

Sponsoring the conference on childhood and youth in wartime are Community Welfare Federation and its 95 Community Chest agencies, the Council of Social Agencies, County Board of Education, City Board of Education, County War Council, City War Council, California State Youth Authority and Parent-Teacher Association.
