## Spot Census Not To be Used In Dividing Gas Tax

In accordance with an opinion given to Director of Public Works C. H. Purcell by Attorney General R. W. Kenney, apportionment to California cities of the 4-cent gas tax funds for the current fiscal year beginning July 1 by the Division of Highways will be based upon the decennial census of 1940 except as modified by some 30 special censuses which have been taken in compliance with the requirements of Chapter 581 of the Statutes of 1943 made by the U. S. Bureau of Census and which have been certified to the Department of Public Works. Purcell said that the only course he can pursue is that dictated by the attorney general, who holds that sample or spot check censuses, such as Torrance officials have been seeking, are not the type of census contemplated by the Legislature of 1943 when it amended the law governing the distribution of 4-cent gas tax funds to municipalities for the duration of the war. Thirty odd California cities have had special censuses taken by Bureau of Census at the expense of each such city. Several sample population counts have been taken chiefly for the purpose of allocation of food-stuffs, needs for housing, schools, transportation, hospitalization, public utilities, day-care for workers' children and similar problems arising in congested areas. Approximately 50 California cities have sought to obtain from the Bureau of Census on the basis of sample censuses a certificate of determination of population for the purposes set forth in Chapter 581, Statutes of 1943. The Director of Census has refused to issue any type of cer-

## Used Trucks Will Cost More

To assist in maintaining vital transportation facilities, the Office of Price Administration has announced that dealers' mark-ups for warranty sales of used commercial vehicles of model years 1937 and later have been increased to encourage their repair and maintenance and keep them on the road. Effective Sept. 4, the amendment to the used truck regulation also changed the warranty provisions so that dealers are liable for only half the expense that may arise under warranties. This "50-50" warranty plan is the same contained in the used passenger car regulations. Prior to the new action, warranty mark-ups were not always sufficient to meet expenses incurred in repairing trucks to meet the warranty requirements. OPA said. Dealers were selling more trucks "as is" than with warranties.
