Instructions for the conduct of members of the State Guard on "V" Day have been received and will be relayed to the men at the earliest possible time, Major Fish said.

"This is a time when millions of persons will be rejoicing," Major Fish said, "and the State Guard has a definite assignment in the participation of this rejoicing and celebration."

Telephone Co. Gives \$85,000 To War Fund

We feel that the Sunday show recently staged in our city park by the rodeo was a dishonor to the God of our nation and a discredit to the high moral standard of our city.

That these resolutions are not alone the sentiments of our ministers but also of the people of our churches.

PLAN WAR CHEST TIME, HILLMAN LEE URGES AS DRIVE DATE APPROACHES
