Post-War Wonders are Described To Rotarians by E. F. Flynn

"Many people believe that because geographical frontiers have vanished that all opportunity has gone with these frontiers," said Edward F. Flynn, director of public relations of the Great Northern Railway Co., St. Paul, in an address on "Shores of Opportunity," delivered to the Torrance Rotary club Sept. 14. Flynn contended, "There is, however, a new frontier for every generation. Present frontiers are largely mechanical and technological. Many believe that we are reaching the end of the automotive frontier which began some forty years ago, but a great automotive re- search engineer (Charles P. Kettering of General Motors) recently said that 'we are coming into a new automotive frontier because we do not know anything about engineering yet. Undoubtedly this new automotive frontier will open up as soon as the war is over. We are likely to have a new lighter and less expensive automobile operating with 150 octane gasoline which will give us perhaps 50 miles to the gallon'."

Flynn described new houses, which he thinks will be built of lignin, a wood or lumber plastic, with perhaps more or less magnesium or aluminum for roofs and other parts of the homes. "In 10 or 15 years from now no one will want to live in any house that we today consider modern because the new houses will have so many electrical and other new and automatic features that the present homes will soon be considered obsolete. The new house will be fireproof and bombproof, whereas today 75 per cent of our homes are inflammable and the other 25 per cent obsolete."

"We are producing more aluminum than any other nation in the world today, the amount now being over 2,500,000,000 pounds annually. Before the war, very little magnesium was taken from mines, brine marshes or elsewhere. Now, Dow Chemical Company is taking about 30 million pounds of magnesium a month from the ocean. It is said that in every cubic mile of ocean there are nine billion pounds of magnesium or a to-

The speaker told of new uses for soybeans and displayed wool and rubber exhibits made from soybeans, also wool made from casein or skim milk. Mr. Flynn also displayed many other late kinds of plastics and synthetic materials which he described.

California State Guardsmen, soldiers on the home front, are doing their part to save the lives of their brothers on the battlefronts.

Organized donations of blood to the Red Cross Blood Bank are being carried on by the nine companies of the 2nd Battalion area, according to Major A. Milton Fish, commanding officer.

Company A of Long Beach recently turned out 45 men to donate blood and other units have contributed similarly.

Company H of Torrance is arranging for its men to visit the blood bank at an early appearance of the mobile unit in that city, according to Capt. R. L. Lewellen, commanding.

"The knowledge that State Guardsmen are serving on the home front ready to protect communities from possible enemy attack is a constant source of satisfaction to the boys on foreign soil, as evidenced by letters we receive," Major Fish said. "The State Guardsmen are doing even more than just that. They are giving their blood regularly to save the lives of men wounded in battle."

Save That New Gasoline 'Stub,' Warns Daniels

Motorists now receiving their new gasoline "A" books should save the stub of their application blank which is returned with the book as this blank must be presented to the local OPA board with each application for a gasoline ration.

This warning was given today by F. W. Daniels, chief clerk of the local board. Many queries are being received by the local board, Daniels said, as to the value of the stub.

"A record of all future gasoline mileage rations issued will be entered on the reverse side of this stub by local boards as such rations are issued," Daniels said. "This record must be presented each time new rations are requested by the motorist."

A reminder that upon receiving the new "A" coupons every motorist should immediately endorse each coupon with the license number and state of registration of his car was also given by the ration executive. Undersigned coupons are not valid and subject to confiscation when found.

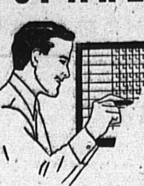
Pays \$10 Fine For Letting Son, 15, Drive
