3140,000,240 State Controller Harry B, Ri-ley today announced that the state's general fund eash excess over current obligations on Aug. 31, 1944, was \$146,000,240, as compared with an excess of \$120,047,348 at the end of the preceding month and an excess of \$80,564,615 on Aug. 31, 1943. The present cash excess, said Riley, represents an increase of, \$19,950,776 represents an excess of August revenues over expen-ditures. The remainder of the increases consists of \$2,080 of miscellaneous nonrevenue re-ceipts.
