

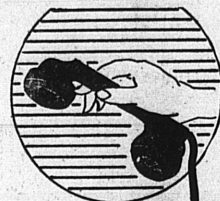
Leisure Time Activity for Youth Planned

FATS SALVAGE FIGURES DROP IN THIS AREA

Fears that overoptimism regarding the war would seriously curtail the supply of fats and oils for munitions and medical uses were expressed by the War Production Board as its monthly survey again revealed a falling off in the amount of waste fats salvaged by Southern California housewives.

For the second successive month, collections dropped and the August total stood at only \$57,355 as against \$97,234 pounds in July and 973,248 pounds in June.

Torrance and Long Beach housewives turned in 4,577 pounds, the WPB survey revealed.

"While some of this loss might be attributed to warm weather and part to the fact that many pork cuts were returned to the ration list, it looks as if there's a growing let-down in the effort being put into fats conservation by a good many people because of a mistaken idea that the need is less.

"There are two big reasons that fat-saving is still urgent. First, our generals report that they're using more bombs and heavy shells than ever in history. Second, it's going to take more of the same to blast the Nips out of those islands and the mainland of Asia.

"There's still a battle to be won—keep on saving that grease!"

Navy Calls for Radio Men to Enter Service

The Navy's need for men qualified for training as radio technicians was re-emphasized today by George W. Saunders, Spic(R) USNR, recruiter in charge of the San Pedro Navy Recruiting Station.

Saunders stated that men who are eligible for voluntary enlistment in the naval service also are eligible to take the Eddy Test. This examination determines whether the applicant has aptitude along lines required in the radio technician field. Those who pass the test may be rated seaman, first class, and sent to special Navy schools.

The Eddy Test may be taken at the San Pedro Navy Recruiting Station, located in room 16 of the U. S. Post Office and Custom House, any week day between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. The examination is a comprehensive one covering basic mathematics, fundamental electricity, elementary physics, practical shopwork and simple radio.

Navy radio technicians have many important duties, such as installing, repairing and maintaining radio communication equipment, radio direction finders and many other extraordinary electronic devices. This field is one of the most fascinating and colorful developed by the war and men therein not only will hasten the day of victory but will be able to look to new opportunities in commercial enterprise after the war is over.

Lumber Rules Explained by Federal Board

Although Southland lumber yards have been authorized to sell priority-free one-third of their Sept. 1 inventories of certain kinds of lumber, the supply for home builders and other civilians will remain scarce until the war needs are met.

Lumber released for sale is of all grades except Nos. 2, 3 and 4, Idaho white pine, Ponderosa pine and sugar pine.

Would-be home builders still are limited to a total of \$200 worth of residential construction in any given year, unless authorization is secured.

Here are the rules:

1. If you want to build a new home, you may qualify under quotas set up from time to time by the National Housing Agency. Go to your nearest FHA office for information.

2. If you want to remodel your present home or add a porch, patio or other improvement, don't do it now—put it off for a while. Invasion needs must come first and lumber will be more plentiful later.

3. If you need to do minor repair work, lumber is available without priorities. Each lumber dealer is given a small amount each quarter-year for this purpose.

4. If your roof is sagging, if termites have eaten away the floor joists, or if a fire has caused serious damage, you may qualify for priorities. The place to apply is at the nearest FHA office, NOT WPB.

Stations Now Accept 'R' Gas Coupons

Beginning Friday, Sept. 22, all gasoline service stations began to accept off-highway "R" coupons.

To reduce illegal use of "R" coupons a ban against their acceptance by most filling stations has been in effect since April 1, 1944. Now, however, the "R" coupons are serially numbered and any diverted from non-highway to vehicle use can be traced directly back to the person who was issued the coupons. So, OPA explained, the ban is being lifted to permit any retail gasoline outlet to accept "R" coupons for non-highway use.

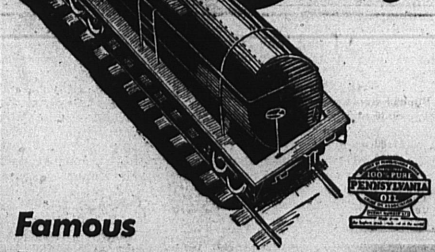
