TWO WOUNDED
IN BATTLE

The parents, in a telegram: "Deeply regret to inform you that your son, Private First Class Edgar C. Smith, U.S.M.C., was killed in action in the performance of his duty and service of his country. No information available at present regarding disposition of remains. Temporary burial in locality where death occurred. You will be promptly furnished any additional information received. To prevent any possible aid to our enemies do not divulge the name of his ship or station. Please accept my heartfelt sympathy. Letter follows. A. A. Vandegrift, Lt. Gen. U.S.M.C., Commandant of the Marine Corps."

This telegram was received this week. Born in Atlantic, Iowa, the deceased has a sister, Phyllis, 15, a student at Torrance High school, and a brother, Sammy, 8, who live at the home address.

The Marine, who was 19 at the time of his death, received his basic training at San Diego, was transferred to Camp Pendleton for amphibious training and prior to shipping out to a South Pacific base was stationed at Camp Elliott. He was attached to the 1st Marine Division, 7th Marine Regiment.

His father is employed as a crane operator at National Supply Co.

T/5 Everett V. Richhart, 35, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry G. Richhart of 1424 W. 218th st., died in France as a result of wounds. "The Secretary of War asks me to assure you of his deep sympathy in the loss of your son, Technician Fifth Grade Everett Vincent Richhart. Reports received state he died Aug. 19 in France. Letter follows," said the Adjutant General, J. A. Uilo, Friday evening.

Born in Long Beach Everett V. Richhart moved to Torrance when his parents came here as pioneers of the community.

Among survivors are the following brothers and sisters: John R. Richhart, Miss Mildred, Mrs. Dale H. Wright, all of Torrance; Mrs. Vernon J. Halsted, Long Beach; Harry G. Seabees, South Pacific; Raymond D., a private with the Army in India.

T/5 Richhart entered service in February, 1941, and arrived overseas December, 1942, in North Africa. His first action followed invasion of France by one week. He was a Torrance High graduate, class of W. 27. Outstanding in athletics he held letters in baseball, basketball, track, football a record for many years.

He made his home with the late George W. and Mrs. Woodward of Dunsmuir. He served as a scoutmaster for a number of years and as Sunday school teacher of a class of boys and steward of Methodist church.

Receiving his basic training at San Luis Obispo, where he served in an ambulance corps, he volunteered for service as a paratrooper after he arrived overseas.




