Egg Ceilings Announced by Government

Egg ceiling prices for the Grade A large size beginning with November 1945, were announced today by Office of Price Administration.

The November maximum retail price per dozen was set at 69c. In January it will be 61c; March, 49c; July, 55c, and next September, 67c.

The new prices, OPA officials pointed out, are generally higher for the fall months of the year and lower for the spring months than previous prices for these periods. This adjustment will not increase the annual cost of eggs to the ultimate consumer, but permits the producer to receive full parity in each month of the year. Two cents may be added to the above prices when eggs are sold in weeks.

Workers Refusing Suitable Jobs Are Penalized

Giving effect to a recent decision of the Supreme Court, the California Department of Employment will deny unemployment insurance benefits for an indefinite period to all workers who, without good cause, refuse to accept suitable employment. This announcement was made by James G. Bryant, chief, Division of Public Employment Offices and Benefit Payments, who stated that a decision of the highest California court in the case of Whitcomb Hotel, Inc., vs. California Employment Commission renders invalid a former rule of the commission limiting the disqualification period to six weeks.

Under the court's interpretation, Bryant explained, one who refuses suitable employment without good cause is not involuntarily unemployed through no fault of his own, and cannot claim benefits until he again brings himself within the provisions of the statute. In conformity with the decision, the California Employment Stabilization Commission must require workers to accept subsequent employment before a disqualification for refusal without good cause of suitable work can be removed, Bryant stated. The important thing for the worker to remember, said Bryant, is that if he refuses suitable employment without good cause, he is liable to a disqualification from receiving benefits indefinitely until he has again accepted employment in good faith and has become unemployed for other reasons.

The benefit checks of unemployment insurance claimants for past weeks will not be affected by the decision, Bryant said. Statements of charges to employers' reserve accounts subsequent to July 1, 1943, will not include payments made to claimants as a result of the rule which was held invalid by the court, he said.

The department has instituted a review of all payments made as a result of the application of the six-week limitation rule, Bryant explained. This rule will save employers the necessity of protesting charges to their reserve accounts as a result of the court's decision as these charges are being automatically eliminated.

RATION FACTS

MEATS, CHEESES, CANNED MILK, BUTTER, CANNED FRUIT—Book 4 red stamps, 10 points, A8 through Z8 and A5 through H5, J5 and K5, valid indefinitely.

PROCESSED FOODS—Book 4 blue stamps, 10 points, A8 through Z8 and A5 through N5, P5 through R5, valid indefinitely.

NOTE—New red and blue stamps will become valid on or about the first of each month.

SUGAR—Book 4 stamps 30, 31, 32 and 33 valid indefinitely for five pounds each, stamp 40 good for five pounds for home canning through Feb. 28, 1945.

Obtain application for additional canning sugar at local OPA boards. Application, when filled out, must be accompanied by spare stamp 37. Applicants may request up to 20 pounds per ration book. Second period applications may be filed to Oct. 20.

SHOES—Book 3 airplane stamps 1 and 2 good indefinitely. NOTE: Take book along to make purchase. Another shoe stamp valid Nov. 1.

GASOLINE—A13 coupons good for four gallons to Dec. 21, B2, B3, C2 and C3 coupons good for five gallons.

All coupons must be endorsed on face with car license number and state of registration. PRICES—For all information regarding prices contact the Price Clerk of your local board.

State Refunding Compensation Premium Excess

Paul Scharrenberg, director of industrial relations, has announced that on Oct. 2, in accordance with the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Laws, the State Compensation Insurance Fund began its annual refund to California employers, returning the excess premiums collected during 1943. The fund operates on the basis of furnishing insurance to employers at cost. After the payment of full compensation and medical benefits to injured workmen and making provision for claims reserves and a reasonable surplus for catastrophic hazards, the remaining surplus premiums are returned to the policyholders. The total sum to be refunded this year will exceed \$5,000,000, the largest amount for any year since the fund was established in 1914.

During 30 years of service to California employers and their employees, the fund has disbursed \$103,263,370 as benefits to injured employees and their dependents in accordance with the humane intent of our workmen's compensation laws.

Reserves and surplus totaling \$20,256,829 are set aside in accordance with law to complete the payment of compensation benefits and to cover any contingencies that may arise.

Road Maps Big Item In Coast Defense Plans

Defense of Southern California immediately after Pearl Harbor which was under the direction of Gen. Joseph Stilwell, now fighting the Japanese in Burma, was planned with the only complete map of the region—peacetime road maps, it was learned today.

Originally intended as an aid to motorists on business and pleasure trips, the maps proved invaluable because, as road maps, they were more practical for drivers of mechanized equipment, jeeps, and trucks than highly technical topographic survey sheets, the only other detail maps available at the time.

Entirely without charge, more than 200,000 maps have been made available by the Automobile Club of Southern California to the armed forces since the day after Pearl Harbor when the club was asked for charts of the Southern California sector.

Since then the club's cartographers have performed numerous special assignments for the Western Defense Command. A new map of the San Francisco Bay area, metal maps for strategy conferences, and "hot spot" maps for the military police were among the special jobs.

Coded maps of military installations were compiled, and the Automobile Club acted as a pool for maps of foreign countries. Gen. George S. Patton used the club's road maps to train his desert tank corps, and special "crash maps" were made for the Army Air Force.

Praise has come from the armed forces for the excellence of civilian road maps, and one Army official stated, "Such generous and unflinching aid in the war effort is an outstanding act of patriotism."

Election Day Gas Rationing Is Explained

Special gasoline rations will be available with which to carry voters to and from the polls for the purpose of voting in public elections, including primaries, under an amendment of the gasoline rationing regulations, Paul Bankdale d'Orr, OPA district rationing chief, said today.

"Local boards working to conserve our tight gasoline supply will not issue such special rations indiscriminately," d'Orr said. "As most voters live within easy walking distance of neighborhood polling places, or have public transportation available, such issuance is expected to be restricted to cases involving invalids or other incapacitated citizens who could not otherwise exercise their right of franchise."
