"Because of an unusually strong response from volunteer workers and organizations, the 93 million Christmas seals to be mailed to Los Angeles county residents are folded for mailing more than a month early."

This announcement was made by Eugene P. Clark, chairman of the Combined Christmas Seal Fund for the Los Angeles County Tuberculosis and Health Association, Saturday.

"Folding of seals started Oct. 1 and since that time more than 250 women and girls have volunteered to help us."

"I want to express my deep appreciation to Mrs. Ida Baker and the War Council for organizational aid and to the Red Cross, the Business and Professional Women's Club, the Campfire Girls, and the Girl Scouts," he said.

The 1944 Christmas seal of "The Jolly Postman" will be mailed to Los Angeles County residents when the 38th annual seal sale opens Nov. 20.

New Chairman of Welfare Group MacDonnell Back at Chamber Job

The newly formed Torrance advisory committee of the Family Welfare Association has elected Mrs. Helen Miller to be its chairman in the coming year. Mrs. Miller has long been one of Torrance's more civic-minded citizens and has served in past years as president of the Torrance Relief Society, chairman of Red Cross Home Service, past matron of Eastern Star, White Shrine (secretary), Betsy Ross Club, past guardian of Job's Daughters.

She comes well qualified to her new task of guiding the Family Welfare Committee, which is to work in an advisory capacity with the Family Welfare workers in this area, Mrs. Beulah Byles, counselor, and Mrs. Josephine Price, executive secretary.

Members of the advisory committee are Mrs. Helen Miller, Mrs. Dorothy Jamieson, Mr. Sam Levy, Mr. James G. Caldwell, Rev. Harry Branton, Rev. Ben Lingenfelter, Miss Sara Vaubel, Mrs. Beulah Byles, and Mrs. Josephine Price, district secretary.

Pat MacDonnell, who had offices in Torrance for months as manager of the war housing area, Nov. 1 will resume his duties as secretary of the Gardena Valley Chamber of Commerce, from which position he was given leave of absence in order to serve in the federal government post.

He has resigned his federal position, recently expanded when he took over the Long Beach housing office.

At the Gardena Valley Chamber, MacDonnell will first undertake a postwar planning program, it was announced.

This will include improvement of Alondra Park as a county recreation center, flood control and a solution of the southwest area water problem.

As Chamber of Commerce secretary, MacDonnell is credited with lifting the Mattoon Act assessment district from Gardena Valley, paving the way for the residential and industrial development that has taken place in the last three years.

MacDonnell served as war housing aide to the city of Torrance for almost a year, during

which he assisted materially in easing that city's critical shortage of homes for war workers. He maintains a fruit ranch home in Torrance.
