The second half showed Torrance kicking off again. Narbonne ran two short gaining plays, and lost 15 yards for holding. They attempted a punt which was blocked by Walt Hiller. When the Gauchos finally got a punt away it put the Tarbabe deep in scoring territory.

Ralph George carried the ball for three substantial gains and a first down, but Narbonne began to hold, and after a short gain and two losses the Tarbabe lost the ball on a fumble. Narbonne kicked out of bounds on their own 30, which began our first scoring drive. Bennett went for nine yards and George for three; result: first down. An offside and runs by George and Bennett accounted for two more first downs. Then Ralph George heaved a pass to Bill Johnson in the end zone for six points.

Again Joe Waters of the Tarbabe kicked off. After a series of short gains and an exchange of punts, Torrance intercepted a Narbonne pass, and began another drive. From there to the four-yard line, the score sheet reads: Bennett two, Bennett 11, pass incomplete, Bennett one, George nine, Bennett four. Then on second down, Ralph George went outside tackle for the touchdown. Bennett's conversion try was low.

Narbonne scored. The conversion was no good. Narbonne kicked off, and after two plays the game ended, 13-6.

Check Tires, Batteries Carefully
