

## Famous Stables Entering at Hollywood Park

Charles S. Howard, the magic name among horse owners to Southland racing fans, is bringing his stable to Hollywood Park for the 34-day meeting which opens with the Premiere Handicap Wednesday, Nov. 1. Howard's trainer, J. H. Stotler, is shipping the famous stable from New York with such equine stars included as Porter's Cap, Bismark Sea, son of Seabiscuit, Miss Doreen and Palace Guard.

Brondcloth, who set the pace for the Kentucky Derby this year and barely missed bringing fame and glory to his owner, Mrs. George Poulson, when he was beaten out by Pensive, has arrived at Hollywood Park for the meet.

Making his first appearance under saddle since his injury in the Withers Handicap at New York early in June, Brondcloth furnished the thrills for some 30 railbirds who lined the training track early yesterday morning at Hollywood Park. The son of Good Goods was slowly ponied with young Bud Leavitt aboard, trainer Dad Leavitt watching the smooth action of the horse.

In addition to Brondcloth some 30 more steeds were at work. Speed was shown by runners under the care of trainer Willard Baker. Aboard the Baker horses was Jimmie Thornburg, sensation of the mid-west tracks a season ago. The Oklahoma born youngster will ride for Baker and already has carded his first stake mount on Dragna and Baker's Last Gold, nominated for the Golden States Breeders Handicap to be run the first Saturday of the meeting, Nov. 4, at a mile and one-sixteenth, for \$15,000 added.

A check up yesterday with Assistant Racing Secretary Barry Whitehead disclosed that there are over 190 head of horses bedded down at Hollywood Park. The largest stable is that of W. W. Crenshaw, the "Banana King," who has 25 head stabled under the eye of trainer Roy Lewis.

Additional stables undergoing rigorous duties each morning include David Butler, 6; C. R. Leavitt, 8; Baker and Dragna, 11; B. Moore, 5; H. O. Lawry, 3; Happy Stable, 9, which includes Happy Issue, Isaroma, Barsand, Banker Jim and others; L. Bechist, 6, including Orion, Ante Over, War Valor, Mitchess. All the latter are winners this season.

W. E. Boeing's stable has ten. Among them are Foot Free, Block to Block, Truckee, Diamond Drill, Inspired, Mighty Isle, Ohm and Devil's Slide. Moose Helm, former great rider of a half dozen years ago, again returns to Hollywood Park with the George Stratton stable consisting of two and three year olds only. The best of them are Top Row Baby, Helm's Pride, Aroc and Janice Pet.

Honors as first entered for the \$75,000 Hollywood Gold Cup to be run Dec. 16 at Hollywood Park as the closing feature of the 34-day meeting which starts Wednesday, Nov. 1, go to Marriage, Doggone and Appleknocker. They are from the stable of Coward and Du Pay.
