Regulations governing the mailing of Christmas greeting cards and packages to service men and women overseas have been announced by Postmaster C. Earl Conner, as follow;

The War Department advises that Christmas greeting cards for soldiers overseas must be sent in sealed envelopes and prepaid at the first-class rate. The War Department further turges that such cards be mailed at once stating that cards mailed now will, according to the Army Postal Service, reach even the most remote A.P.O.s. by Dec. 25.
