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Navy Urges New Use of 'V' Mail

Announcing the curtailment of naval flying over North Atlantic routes during the winter months, the Navy Department this week again recommended increased use of V-mail to assure messages from home to men of the Navy in the European theatre of operations.
Navy officials stated that airmail letters, until spring, will take an average of two weeks for delivery, as compared to one week during summer months.
"Air mail will continue to be slow during the coming winter months," they said, "because naval flying over northern Atlantic routes has been curtailed until better flying weather in the spring."
V-mail, they revealed, rating priorities because of its space-saving value, will continue to reach its destination in the normal time of five to seven days.
The equivalent of 25 sacks of airmail letters can be carried in one small V-mail sack. Because of the quantity of airmail post, much of it will have to be carried in ships during the winter, authorities stated.

Rev. C. J. Carpenter, Bishop of Alabama and chairman of the Protestant Episcopal church's Division of Youth, has appointed him national field representative for the Pacific coast of the church.
The Rev. Mr. Wheeler will be informed concerning the youth convention's summer conference, youth camps and parish meetings to keep such groups well informed concerning the youth programs of the church.
"The duties assumed are part time and in no way will affect the Rev. Mr. Wheeler's position as rector of St. Andrew's it was said.

In January, he will attend a conference at San Francisco of the National Youth leaders to plan the ensuing year's work.

Bible One of Seven Wonders, Says Minister

"The Bible rightfully deserves a place as one of the seven wonders of the ancient, the medieval and the modern worlds," according to the statement of Rev. H. Wesley Roloff in his sermon Sunday at the Central Evangelical Community church, Torrance. Speaking on the subject, "Seven Wonders of the Bible," the local pastor said that the value of the Bible in society and life could not be computed in any monetary way. Rare manuscripts of the Bible are valued at more than one-half a million dollars. The Bible story has inspired the greatest in art and literature. Raphael's original of the Madonna and Child is valued at more than \$5,000,000. All of this and much more is contained within the pages of your Bible and mine. It is man's choicest treasure," the pastor said.

In enumerating seven outstanding wonders of the Bible the pastor explained that it was difficult to choose between the many wonders found within its pages. He first asserted that the Bible is "man's oldest and yet his newest book, more contemporary and up-to-date than tomorrow's newspaper. Though much of it is more than 3,500 years old, it is still as vital for us today as when it was first spoken." Other wonders of the Bible mentioned were: The Bible's unique authorship, the work of both God and man; its universal appeal, to all ages, classes and races; its prophetic truthfulness; its supreme revelations, of sin and Jesus Christ as the all-sufficient cure; its power to transform human life

The children will take their presents to St. Andrew's church school next Sunday.

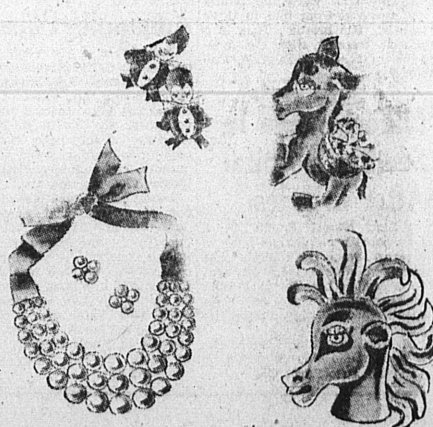
The monthly prayer service of intercession for the members of the armed forces from families of St. Andrew's church will be held at 7:30 p. m.
