Dozens of special shoes have been purchased; dozens of individual braces have been made, and many surgical procedures have been completed where all else had failed."

In announcing the above appointments, Roy E. Nafziger, chairman of the executive committee, continues: "While we regard the funds available to us in the nature of a public trust, and can justify to ourselves and to our contributors every expenditure, assistance is given in a warm and friendly manner. It is not given grudgingly, only when it is sought. Have a Can of Eggs or a Box of Milk, Says Army

Open a can of eggs and a box of milk for breakfast. Sounds silly, doesn't it? But that's what's cooking with the Army chef—the man who feeds the men who fight.

Of course, it's done with dehydrated food, not mirrors. A whole new field in cookery has been opened by the Army's use of moisture-minus eatables. Great advantages are gained when a fast-moving, hard-fighting Army can be fed from a few compact packages.

Noted for its inexpensive qualities and simple transportation, dehydration has another point in its favor—PRESERVATION. Micro-organisms responsible for food spoilage are still present in the dehydrated form—but dormant, due to the lack of water.

By definition, dehydrated foods are "fresh foods from which water and inedible portions such as peels, cores, stems and bones have been removed." So, forget about cleaning the vegetables, cracking the eggshells, or anything else. Just soak in the right amount of water the required length of time, and proceed with "business as usual."

An Army cook overseas can turn out a meal of some 20 different items, all made with dehydrated food. Special schools in this country are now being conducted for all "Gee-Eye" food-fixers to learn the proper handling of the products.

Included in the long list of foodstuffs processed for shipping are meats, cheese, milk, eggs, vegetables. More are being added every day and all are a forerunner of the American kitchen of the future—eggs in a can, and milk in a box!

Prices on Yule Light Sets are Regulated by OPA

OPA has ruled that prices for Christmas tree lighting sets assembled by retailers must not exceed the total of the retail prices for each of the parts, Ralph H. Clarke, head of OPA's consumer durable goods section, announced today.

Clarke pointed out that the order was issued to relieve the manufacturing retailers of the burden of filing reports to OPA for maximum prices, and to prevent inflationary tendencies in the sale of assembled articles.

Sets other than those assembled by retailers continue to be controlled by former maximum price regulations. No new sets are permitted to be made.

This decision has doubtless meant the difference in many cases between a life of creative endeavor and a life of crimped handicaps. We thank you for your assistance, we bespeak your continued support."

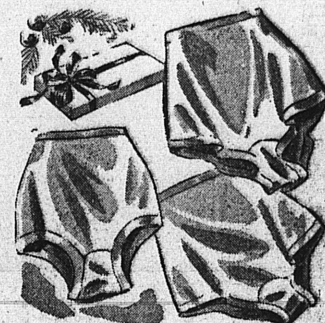

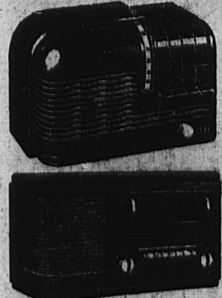
