facilities and an area for meter treatment.

The other building project is that of a warehouse building at the pumping plant north of Torrance blvd., on Elm ave. Drawn by Walker, these plans call for a 40 by 50-foot building including a valve and fitting storage space, a work area, tool room and other facilities including a ramp into the building for use of trucks in loading and unloading. Estimated cost of this building is \$7500.

An additional \$26,050.84 worth of work, planned for the post-war program, includes construction of a 12-inch line on Torrance boulevard west to Maple, south to Plaza del Amo east to Crenshaw blvd.

Eliminate Dead Ends
This work would eliminate several dead ends, improve pressure and make possible expansion of service later.

Lowering of pipe lines on Sonoma, Hickory and Greenwood aves. is another project prepared.

Another is a proposed new pipe line to eliminate four dead ends and provide a bypass in emergency, in the alley between Cravens and Sartori aves, from Gramercy ave. to the alley west of Engracia ave.

Also included is a proposed new pipe line and hydrants to serve new houses and to be used as an emergency feed line to the city on Dominguez st. from Crenshaw blvd. to the east of Amapola ave. This line would eliminate some trouble being encountered in Mariopa Heights.

Another project is a proposed new line and hydrants to eliminate two dead ends and provide an emergency feed line for National Supply Co., another to serve Columbia Steel Co. and other industries in the neighborhood, and another to serve Doak Aircraft Co. and other present and future industries in that area.

Manager Stanger said that his postwar program must of necessity be confined to the

Coast Guard to Make It Easier For 17-Year-Olds

Only one year of high school is now required of 17-year-old applicants for general enlistment in the United States Coast Guard, it was announced today by the Coast Guard Recruiting Station for the Eleventh Naval District, Los Angeles.

It was pointed out that the Coast Guard will continue to enlist men of 17 for an indefinite period of time.

Previously two years of high school was the minimum. Applicants must bring proof of age and parental consent with them and must be in good general health with 20/30 uncorrected vision in each eye. Minimum height is 64 inches.

area now served by Torrance Municipal Water District No. 1 because there is no way in which the district can serve other areas in Torrance, under the law.

No Service

He said sections of Torrance outside of the district must look to the various private water companies serving them, or form their own separate water districts to get municipal service, including the use of the water from Boulder Dam and the Colorado river which is brought to Torrance in a 20-inch pipe line.

The other firms serving various parts of Torrance are Quandt Pumping Co., at Waleria and vicinity; California Water Co., in Hollywood Riviera section of Torrance; Narbonne Water Co. No. 2 and 3, in South Torrance; Dominguez Water Co., just west of Municipal Water District No. 1; Moneta Water Co., in North Torrance, and American States Water Co., in North Torrance.

A greater area in Torrance is unserved at this time than is provided with water, pipe lines and service, Stanger pointed out, despite the fact that many companies operate within the city limits of the municipality.

Pfc. Simons Is Wounded Near Metz, France

After crossing the Moselle with his Armored Infantry company, Private First Class Henry M. Simons, 32, of 2058 250th st., Lomita, Calif., reached positions near Metz before he was knocked out of action by mortar fragments. He has been awarded the Purple Heart at 185th United States Army general hospital in England where he is recovering from his wounds.

Lieutenant R. D. Vachen of Sanford, Me., his ward officer, said: "Pfc. Simons is getting along fine and his recovery is rapid."

"Ten days after landing in France I joined my unit in a bivouac area near a small French town," said Pfc. Simons. "Six days later, we jumped off in a drive for the Moselle river." After an all-night ride in the half-track his unit reached the river and crossed at dusk the following afternoon.

"We dug in for the night as intermittent sniper fire and machine guns rattled in the distance," he said. "Early next morning we were hit by a sudden 88mm barrage. Two tanks went up in flames before we located the 88s in a cemetery and silenced them."

Pushing ahead through infantry fire the soldiers advanced through a small village before being forced to dig in.

"Jerry approached our positions and was driven back by bazooka," Pfc. Simons said. "Two days later the Germans threw a heavy mortar barrage over and I was hit in the arm by a shell which struck only a few feet away. Medical soldiers gave me first aid and I was carried to safety in a jeep."

Pfc. Simons entered the Army in January, 1944, and received his training at Camp Fannin, Texas. His wife, Mrs. Juanita Simons, and daughter, Gloria Jean, live at the 250th st. address. He is the son of Math Simons of Savanna, Okla. Two brothers, J. A. and Anton, are serving with the Army.
