## EXPANSION OF POSTOFFICE BUILDING NEEDED AS LOCAL RECEIPTS REACH \$124,568

The need for expanded Torrance postal facilities, more building space and windows to serve the patrons, is recognized both by the postal department and by the Torrance Postmaster. It was pointed out as Postmaster C. Earl Conner this week announced that annual postal receipts for Torrance post office has far exceeded the \$100,000 mark.

Representing a 33 percent gain over last year's receipts and almost 100 percent over those of 1942, Torrance post office did a business of \$124,568.74 during the calendar year of 1944, according to Postmaster Conner.

In 1943 the receipts were \$92,839.63, the gain being \$31,729.11. The 1942 receipts were \$64,835.58. The tremendous increase in post office receipts is being handled by total personnel of only 50 percent more than were employed in 1942, according to the postmaster.

The receipts represent the sale of postage, box rents, permit matter, miscellaneous receipts, but do not reflect other departments such as money orders, bonds and postal savings, Conner said.

While he has been receiving tributes from the community for the manner in which his office, with its limited force, handled the tremendous holiday

business, Postmaster Conner in return voiced the appreciation of his office and his staff for the tolerance and generous attitude shown by the patrons of the fast-growing local post office.

"We know the service was not what the community is accustomed to and the department realized that the patrons were entitled to better service," Conner said. "We have done the best we could under the circumstances and the attitude of tolerance on the part of the people is appreciated."

On the other hand, the Torrance Retail Merchants' Association recently sent a letter to the postmaster "to express their sincere and grateful appreciation for the very fine service rendered Torrance industry, commerce and citizenry alike during the Holy Season."

"The prompt delivery service and the courteous demeanor of all of our personnel during these trying periods were a great credit to your leadership, and to the individual efficiency of each and every person in the employ of the Torrance post office."

"Service of the nature demonstrated by your department—over and above the call of duty—make community life more enjoyable."

## Chief Stroh Named to Enforcement Section of L.A. Co. Youth Committee

Chief of Police John H. Stroh, of Torrance, has been named as a member of a nine-man committee which will work with county law enforcement agencies and the Los Angeles County Youth Committee to promote uniformity of laws and ordinances in regard to juvenile delinquents, and uniformity in police reports relative thereto.

Stroh will represent Santa Monica, Inglewood, El Segundo, Hawthorne, Gardena, Hermosa Beach, Redondo Beach, Palos Verdes Estates, Torrance, Manhattan Beach, Culver City, Signal Hill and Avalon on the countywide committee.

In an effort to coordinate the work of all county authorities in dealing with juvenile crime prevention Sheriff E. W. Biscailuz and other authorities played host to 45 chiefs of police or their representatives at a luncheon-meeting in the Hall of Justice Friday.

The nine-man committee was formed as a result as a law enforcement section of the newly-formed Los Angeles County Youth Committee.

Six of the 45 chiefs were appointed by Sheriff Biscailuz to the new committee, each representing several towns.

Other chiefs appointed to the committee and the incorporated cities they represent follow: Chief J. B. Ashurst of Pomona, representing Claremont, Pomona, Laverne, Glendora, Azusa, W. Covina, and Covina. Chief Glen F. McClung of San Marino, representing El Monte, San Marino, Monterey Park, Alhambra, San Gabriel, Arcadia, Sierra Madre, Monrovia, and S. Pasadena.

Chief John C. Gutting of South Gate, representing Compton, Lynwood, South Gate, Huntington Park, Vernon, Maywood, Bell, Montebello, and Whittier.

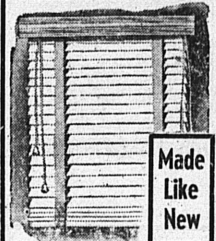
Chief Vernon Rasmussen of Glendale, representing San Fernando, Beverly Hills, Burbank and Glendale.
