

## Morris Bewley, Back From B. Scout Training, Launches Harbor Program

Morris Bewley has resumed his duties as Boy Scout executive for the Harbor district, with headquarters at the Torrance Service Center. Bewley recently attended the Schiff National Training School at Mendham, N. J., from which all professional Scouters must graduate. At Schiff all phases of Scouting are covered by lectures of specialists in the various branches of Scouting, from the lone Scout in the rural area to the operation of the main Scout office in New York City. Particular emphasis is placed on the inadequate number of professional Scouters carrying the program to the boys and the fact that it must be augmented by a lay staff, especially commissioners. "The commissioners' burden is somewhat relieved by other committees of laymen, which are formed to bring the Scout program to the boys," Bewley said. Continuing he reported:

"One of the highlights of the program was the stirring address of Gunnar Berg on boy nature. After hearing his talk, if anyone does not realize that the program of Scouting is for the boys of the nation he has not sincerely grasped the situation. All the work at the school is conducted in the patrol method, men living together and eating together as patrols under patrol leadership. All class work is conducted along these lines. Another instructor who won all the men's hearts is Mr. Macdonald, nicknamed 'Mac' by all. He had charge of camping and took the Scouters on overnight hikes. He endeared himself so much to the men that there were many wet eyes when good-byes were said.

"Mendham is close to Morris-town, N. Y., where General Washington had one of his encampments. Some of the relics are still standing and were ex-

amined by the Scouters. "The council meeting in Los Angeles on Jan. 4 started out the New Year enthusiastically



with a 100 per cent attendance from all cities. The same enthusiasm was displayed by an almost 100 per cent attendance at the district meeting Jan. 8 in Torrance. At the latter meeting, plans were made for the coming year. They are as follows:

"First, training all Scouters in the Harbor district was stressed as one of the most important projects. This will start in February and will consist of basic training for Scoutmasters, Cubmasters, and senior unit leaders. It will be followed by courses for troop committees, district committees and commissioners.

"Second, the need for more commissioners was carefully considered. Bernard Dean of Torrance was elected as neighborhood commissioner. Assistant district commissioners, T. P. Carney of San Pedro, H. E. Willey of Wilmington, Earl Quisenberry of Lomita, Waltera and Torrance, and J. D. Anderson of Gardena, are to see that all neighborhood commissioners' reports are in promptly each month from the units they have visited. The reports should be ready by the last Monday of each month when Dennis Stok of San Pedro will review the compiled report and submit it to the Los Angeles council. All reports should be sent to the Torrance office, which will forward them to Stok.

"Third, the advancement committee, under Eugene Morey of Wilmington, submitted plans for the Boy Scouts Court of Honor to be held at Richard Dana junior high school, Fifth and Cabrillos, San Pedro, on Jan. 19. It was further decided that all unit advancement reports shall be sent to the Torrance office, then cleared through Morey. All such reports for this Court of Honor must be in by Jan. 13 in order to clear for the boys.

"All parents and all citizens who are interested in boys' welfare are urged to attend the Court of Honor, because at this meeting Arthur Schuck will present two Eagle badges and make a speech on the Scouting program. This has been arranged definitely and there will be no error in plans.

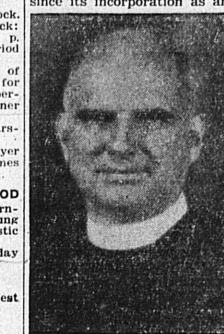
