

Lamphere Family Is All Out for Uncle Sam as Three Members Are in the Service; Two Build Aircraft

All out for Uncle Sam!
That's the Lamphere family of 1628 Elm ave., Torrance.

Father and two sons are in the service; mother and daughter are helping build aircraft parts at Doak Aircraft.

Meet the Lampheres:

Chief M. A. M. Bert C. Lamphere, U. S. N., the head of the family, just got back home after two years' service at Pearl Harbor. A postal clerk at Torrance postoffice prior to entering the Navy Oct. 26, 1942, he landed back in San Francisco just two years and five hours (Dec. 24, 1944), from the time he set sail for the Hawaiian Islands. He is enjoying a rest with the folks at home, but must report back to San Francisco for further duty with Admiral Nimitz on Jan. 24. He had never had previous Navy service, but was a National Guardsman for about 13 years.

Mrs. Mary P. Lamphere has been working at Doak Aircraft since Dec. 1, 1943, not wanting to be idle at a time when her whole family was in it all the way. She is a sheet metal bench worker.

Sgt. George S. Lamphere, one of the sons, 20 years of age, entered the service just one day after his father did, on Oct. 27, 1942. He is with the 21st Photo Reconnaissance Squadron, serving in China with Maj. Gen. Claire L. Chennault. His job includes photographing targets in advance of bombing runs.

Son Frank Lamphere, 18, is a seaman, first class, somewhere out there, last heard of in Leyte campaign. He has been in the service since Nov. 26, 1943.

Daughter Charlotte Lamphere, 23, is hard at work at Doak Aircraft as a riveter, day shift, and that rounds out the whole family at work for the war for an early victory.

She has worked at Doak since Dec. 7, 1943.

As Mrs. Lamphere put it, "I could not sit at home idle while I knew Bert, Frank and George were out there on the front."

lines, so I went to work to do my part to see that the supplies were there when needed." Miss Lamphere agreed.

Sergeant George Lamphere, in one of his most recent letters, expressed the desire that "Dad" could be home for Christmas, and he just made it. His letter written on Dec. 8, in China, told

of the activity of the "Nips," declaring "we were kept away from work and sleep nearly every night while the moon was full."

"When we get an alert," he said, "everyone goes for his helmet, gas mask, rifle, overcoat (because it's darn cold) and take off! We get to our foxholes and then the rub is over; all that is left is 'sweating it out.' When we hear the fighters leave is when the 'sweat' really starts. From then on, when a plane is heard in the air, there are many guesses as to whether it is enemy or friendly. Can't fail to recognize the sound of the Nips. Their engines don't sound synchronized. Everyone is alert and nervous, though, so get mixed up often. Sitting in the foxholes, we can watch the Chinese coolies leaving for the hills, backs piled high with all of their belongings and in a long file, traveling at a dog-trot. The moon would be lovely, if we were sitting in the States. Here it isn't so nice."
