

204 Pints of Blood Given at Red Cross Here

Two hundred and four pints of blood were donated to the Red Cross Torrance branch for use in the military and naval hospitals throughout the world in saving the lives of the wounded, at the visit of the small mobile unit of the Los Angeles chapter here yesterday, and nearly 75 percent of the donors dedicated their blood to some friend or relative in accordance with the new policy of the Blood Bank.

There were sufficient donors to fill the quota of the small Blood Bank, and 224 persons reported.

Trouble with heating the Civic Auditorium, which is loaned by the city for purposes of the Blood Bank, was mechanical, and has been remedied, Mrs. Maude Kresse, blood bank chairman, said. The room was without sufficient heat for about two hours, she declared.

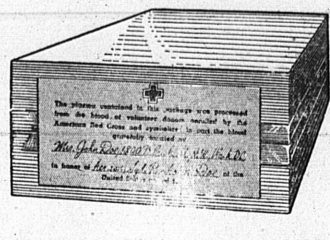

Gas Stations Here Lag In Stamp Accounts

All but three service stations in the Torrance and Lomita district are far behind in their gasoline stamp accounts, and are operating on from one-third to two-thirds of capacity of their tanks, according to the Torrance local board of the OPA.

The government is allowing no coupon replacements unless the coupons are genuine and properly endorsed, it was said. No replacements are made of lost or stolen coupons, it was pointed out.

"Through their own carelessness," a statement said, "service stations are forcing themselves out of business in this territory."

"Black market operations also are under investigation, with one station in Torrance and one on the outskirts under surveillance."

"Gasoline station operators are not subject to the mercy of the OPA when it comes to mis-handling of ration coupons, any more than a depositor is who loses his cash on the way to the bank. If the coupons are good and sufficient, they get replacements, just like the depositor gets his credit to his account."

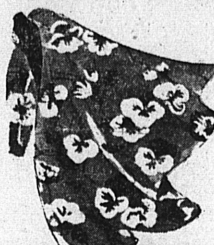

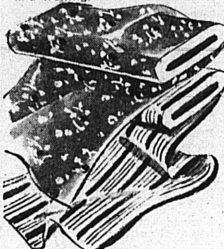

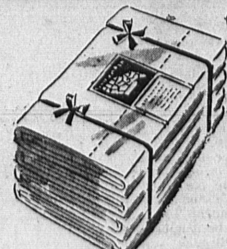
