Odd Lot Shoe Sale Is Due Feb. 19 to Mar. 3

Limited quantities of men's and women's "odd lot" shoes may be sold to consumers ration free at specified price reductions during the two-week period Feb. 19 through March 3, OPA shoe rationing representatives have said.

Two-fold purpose of the temporary ration holiday is to give consumers the benefit of extra shoe mileage that might otherwise remain unused on dealers shelves, and to help dealers clear their stocks of odds and ends and broken sizes.

But due to present demands, Black said, odd lots are readily purchased and the problem on children's shoes continues to be one of supplying enough shoes to meet the stamp demand.
