OCTOGENARIAN TELLS HER FOLLOWING STRIFE OF 1860's -

Gene DeBra, well known Torrance radio technician, a resident and business man resident and business man here for many years, recently received the bilowing story from his former home town paper, The Chillicothe (III.), Bulletin, which carried a re-view of a program presented by the Civic League, in which his Bi.year-old mother, Mrs. H. R. DeBra participated,

"A special feature of the evening was a talk by Mrs. H. R. DeBra who spoke of "Christmas in Old Indiaga." Mrs. DeBra alert and active and most interesting, at the age of 81, told her audience that she had vivid memories of the first Christmas after the Civil War, when, as now, many people thought the war would be over in a few months, a year at longest, Butthey ears dragged on, with the men and their families suffering loneliness, and all manner of physical hardships. It was a happy day when a young mother, with her two tiny daughters (Mrs. DeBra and an older sister) joined the townspeople in hurrying to the top of Cranberry Hill, to welcome the long lines of returning Union soldiers. That Christmas was spent by the family in their new home, a three-room log cabin, with huge stone fireplace, on a good farm granted her father by the government, for his brave service for the Union.

Their Christmas tree was a little pine from their own hill-side, decorated with cranberries from the same hill, popecorn from the farm, and with bittersweet berries, patiently lied on by their mother, with bits of colored thread left over from the rag carpet weaving. Molasses taffy had been poured into pans of clean snow to harden and the young hearts were gladdened with gifts of red woolen mittens and spote, lined, with straw from the season's last threshing, held potatoes, turnips and apples. Their dishes were of lovely glass shipped from Germany on perhaps the first vessel to bring glass to America. Each Christmas after the war became a bit more festive and gifts more abundant as the

Mrs, DeBra said, "Christmas memories of olden days are beautiful for their spirit of love and neighborly helpfulness and kindliness, and I think we are returning to the spirit of those days—America is today lending aid and supplies to the world, and is truly the Promised Land of our Allies. We must do all we can for our returning service men—we must be careful to save, to make good use of all the many gifts a good God has lavished upon our country. Nothing is too much for us to do now, or later, for our brave men, who now, as in days of the Civil War, long for home and family."
