John Rauss Took Part in Luzon Attack

Coast Guardsman John R. Rauss, carpenter's mate second class, of 708 Acacia ave., Torrance, and the rest of the Coast Guard crew of an attack transport are putting the Luzon invasion down in their books as the roughest, toughest action they've ever experienced in Pacific combat operations.

"This time they really meant business," said the local Coast Guardsman and his shipmates. "They served us just about everything on the Jap menu. They tried to get us with bombers, warships and submarines. And those little monkey-faces even tried sneaking up in small boats at night and dynamiting anchored ships. But we got there, unloading our troops and cargo and now we're a big step nearer Tokyo."

Carpenter's Mate Rauss told of anxious, nerve-racking days and sleepless nights as a gigantic invasion fleet threaded its way among Jap-held islands in the central Philippines and steamed up through the South China sea to Lingayen Gulf.

"We've had action every day for a week," the Coast Guardsman and the other crewmen related, "and there were times when things got pretty hot. During one aerial attack the Japs scored a direct hit on the transport right next to us. We were luckier; our casualties were light."

Paying tribute to the Coast Guardsman who manned the ship's landing barges, crew members aboard this transport said: "The way those boys drove their boats right through the heaviest Jap mortar barrage they've ever seen made us proud to be in the Coast Guard."

World War II Vets Service Dates Fixed

Revision of the United States Employment Service's definition of a "Veteran of World War II" to conform to the definition contained in the G. I. Bill of Rights was announced today by H. R. Harnish, state manpower director. This means a "Veteran of World War II" is any person who has served in the active service of the armed forces of the United States subsequent to Sept. 16, 1940, and who has been discharged or released therefrom under conditions other than dishonorable. The term "armed forces" includes the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, Naval Reserve, Coast Guard Reserve (exclusive of Coast Guard Reserve Temporary), National Naval Volunteers, W.A.C., Waves, Spars, and Marine Corps Women's Reserve. Individuals covered by the revised definition will receive full Veterans Service in the United States Employment Service.

Heretofore, interpretation by the U. S. E. S. of "Veterans of World War II" has been any person who served in the armed forces of the United States subsequent to Dec. 7, 1941. The effect of the revision is to include within the definition individuals who were discharged or released prior to Dec. 7, 1941, but subsequent to the operation of the Selective Service Training Act of 1940, and all members of the Coast Guard Reserve except members of the Coast Guard Reserve, temporary.

"America United," the NBC Public Service show which recently made its debut on the air, is heard in this vicinity over radio station KFI.

California ranks highest in any state in veteran placement activities, according to a recent comparison between states, John J. MacGillivray, veteran's employment representative, revealed.

California, U. S. E. S. offices placed 8.5 per cent of the national total, more than any other state. This can be attributed to efficient channelling of veterans through United States Employment Service offices, and is evidence of the cooperation between business and industry with the U. S. E. S., MacGillivray said.

Even victory in Europe appears in no way imminent, Mason, just returned from a Washington conference with top-ranking Army and Navy officers including General Marshall and

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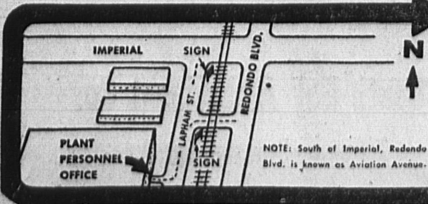
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
