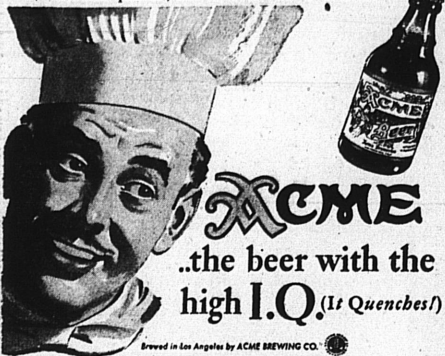

Local Union Criticizes Newspapers

Following the reading of a letter to the City Council from United Steelworkers Union 1414, C. I. O., criticizing newspapers for alleged attacks upon the City Council, and upholding the work of the members of the Council on behalf of the community, the Council Tuesday night on motion of Councilman G. V. Powell ordered a letter sent to the union thanking the members for their interest and support.

The letter from the union, signed by Carl D. Steele, secretary, was written, it was said, because of the treatment of news stories regarding the official actions of Councilman N. H. Cucci at council meetings.

The letter does not mention names of newspapers, and it is printed below in full:

"Dear Sirs:—

"Much discussion during our meetings the past two months have led to a motion which carried and the Secretary was ordered to write the City Council and extend to you our sympathy regarding the continued criticism which you gentlemen find yourselves subjected to by some of the small town newspapers serving this community.

"Some of these papers tell us the City of Torrance should get into their long pants; that the City is now grown up. In the editorials of the same papers, the (what we believe to be) narrow minded editors have taken editorial pot-shots at you gentlemen, whom we believe are trying to run the affairs of the City in a conscientious and business-like manner, for using your own good judgment in making decisions you believe to be for the good of the people.

"These accusations and criticisms, by some of our papers, we think, are due to their small town type of editors, who, unlike our City, have not advanced to the long pants stage, but lag back in the diaper category, thinking only in terms of full page paid advertisements, legal and otherwise, and giving us only the news and reports they themselves want the people to know. Many times true reports and facts remain hidden from the citizenry for the reason, that if they revealed them, it would be giving credit to those whom our newspaper editors wish to oppose, and seem to want to lead our people to believe are incapable of handling the affairs of the City of Torrance.

"We Steelworkers are thankful that we have minds of our own and we can do use the ideas of editors of one-sided newspapers who raise a rumpus if things do not go their way of thinking. Small babies do the same thing. This is why we file some editors and their papers in the diaper category. We hope you gentlemen will overlook and consider the source of the many criticisms you are subjected to and keep on doing the things you believe to be for the benefit of our good citizens of Torrance.

"We Steelworkers are also hoping for the day when we shall have newspapers that will give us first-hand, reliable news from both sides of the fence, and be neutral on all occasions. "Hoping you gentlemen see these ideas as we have tried to convey them to you and that you will continue to give to the City of Torrance the unbiased judgment you have shown in the past. If you do just that, you have our sympathy and objections to any undue criticisms and accusations by any one.

Beds for Vets Asked of City By Committee

James Caldwell, secretary of the Veterans Service Committee of Torrance, has asked the City Council to provide additional beds for veterans, since the load is expected to increase at the Fire Department as more and more veterans are discharged from the army.

Fire Chief J. E. McMaster has been providing six beds for the soldiers, and when Caldwell's letter was read asking for additional beds, Councilman N. H. Cucci suggested that facilities might be provided at the municipal auditorium.

Cucci was asked by Mayor W. H. Tolson to make a study of the need, and to report back.

Teen-Age Dance Scheduled for Tomorrow Night

First of a series of weekly dancing parties for teen-agers, sponsored by the Young Churchmen's League of St. Andrew's Episcopal church, will be held tomorrow (Friday) evening at the Torrance Woman's clubhouse, 1422 Engracia ave.

The party will be held from 7:30 p. m. to 11 p. m., and a nominal charge of twenty-five cents per person will be made, according to the committee of young people in charge. There will be dancing, games, and a coke-bar. The young people are being assisted in their plans by Fred Meier, Y. M. C. A. director, Harry B. Lewis, and the Rev. Paul Moore Wheeler, and adult members will chaperon each party. All teen age boys and girls are invited, whether they are members of the churchmen's league or not, it was explained.

The young people are seeking an appropriate name for the weekly parties, and a \$10 cash prize has been offered for the best suggestion.

Official Data On Boy Scout Park Is Asked

The City Council wants the official information on the Vaughn Scott Boy Scout property in Hollywood Riviera, and has ordered that a report be submitted at its next meeting on the status of the nine-acre park which has been made available to the city.

While it previously had been reported that the property had some \$5,000 back taxes against it, Scott, addressing the council, said that as of Dec. 12, 1944, the back taxes were \$1233. He said that adjoining property owners had no rights to the property, as previously had been claimed.

Scott and his company presented the land to the city for park purposes, but the question of the title and back taxes never was cleared. With the filing of a complete report, the council will decide on procedure in the matter.

Public Hearing On Rezoning Measure Is Set

Public hearing will be conducted by the City Council on Feb. 27 at 8 p. m. regarding the proposed rezoning of sections of Cravens ave. for business, the council has decided.

The planning commission has conducted two hearings on the matter and approved the rezoning. The rezoning will make possible the construction of several store buildings, including a new restaurant building by Herbert Allen, a structure by John Beene, son of the late Jack Beene, and a church edifice by the Church of Christ.

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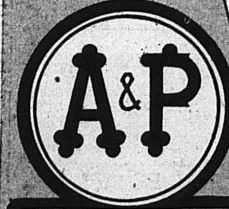
