Capt. Edward M. Crabtree of 2121 West 242nd st., will have to face trial in Portland, Ore., on charges he embezzled \$39,426 last December 26 from a tanker, according to a ruling recently by U. S. Commissioner David B. Head. The veteran skipper who denies the charges and says the ship's payroll disappeared dur-

ing a fire aboard the vessel, has been free on bail while waiting the delayed indictment from Portland authorities.

Non-Stamped Cigarettes to Be Watched by BIR

In a determined effort to stamp out a widespread black-market traffic in unstamped, tax-free cigarettes, the Bureau of Internal Revenue agents is planning an inspection of all retail tobacco dealers. Inspectors point out that tax-free cigarettes and non-stamped tobacco products are for overseas consumption and diversion of such articles for civilian use is a federal law violation.

Internal Revenue Collector Harry C. Westover warns that frequent inspections of Southern California tobacco dealers will continue in an effort to prevent illegal tobacco sales.

Edison Company Warns Boys of Kite Dangers

With the open season on kites already under way, the Southern California Edison company today issued a list of safety rules, designed to prevent kite accident interruptions in vital electric power service.

"Edison lines are delivering the power to operate many war plants, as well as the electricity necessary in our every-day lives," C. C. Bartlett, district manager for the Edison company said. "By following four rules during the kite season, boys and girls can help avoid the costly trouble that comes when flying kites tangle with power lines. And in addition, they will be insuring their own personal safety."

1. Fly a kite in an open field, away from power lines.
2. Use cotton cord. Never use wire, tinsel or metallic cord.
3. Be sure the cord is perfectly dry.
4. If your kite catches in a power line, let go! Do not pull it. Telephone the company owning the line and a lineman will come to get the kite down safely and with the least possible injury to it.

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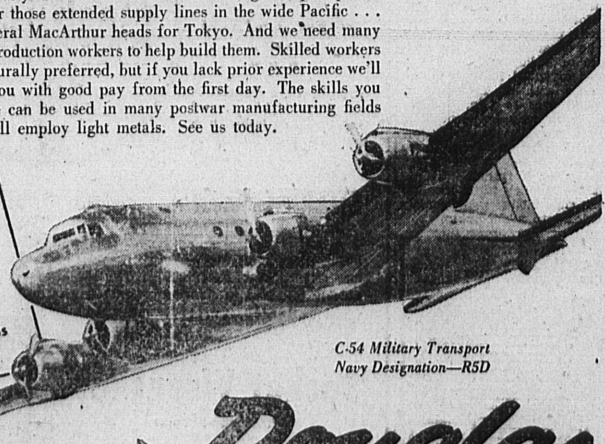

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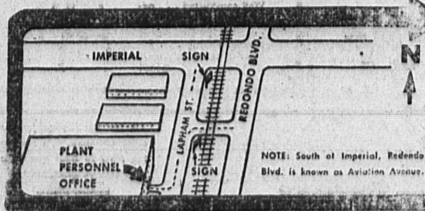


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
