Treize Kin Molded Force To Fight Japs

Col. Wendell W. Fertig, Army engineer in the Philippines, is credited by Gen. Douglas MacArthur with doing a major part of the work of unifying several American and Filipino guerrilla bands during the last two years into an efficient striking force against the Japs.

Colonel Fertig of Golden, Colo., is a brother-in-law of Mrs. Irma Treize, of Arlington ave. His nephews are all Torrance residents. Lt. Robert B. Treize, serving with a tow target squadron in Seattle; Harold G. Treize, A. M. M., 2/c, serving in the South Pacific and Clifford M. Treize, electrician's mate, 2/c, stationed at Rhode Island.

Mrs. Treize reports that his family last saw her brother-in-law three months before Pearl Harbor and the Jap invasion of the Philippines. Fertig, then a major, was last mentioned in the news at the time Bataan fell in April, 1942. It was believed at that time he had been killed or captured. Now, Gen.

P. L. Houston Is Reported as Missing in Action

Pfc. Purnell L. Houston, 25631 Cypress, Lomita, was reported wounded in action during the Luzon battle. He was wounded in the shoulder, on Jan. 24, but says, in a letter home, that it will not keep him down very long. Houston writes that after having malaria twelve times during the three years he has been in the service, nothing can keep him down long.

MacArthur lifts the veil of secrecy to reveal that Colonel Fertig had escaped capture, fled to Mindanao, and that guerrilla units under his command liberated the entire provinces of Lanao and Misamis Occidental, long before the re-invasion of the Philippines.

General MacArthur's announcement stated that native and American guerrillas constantly have thwarted Japan's "greater East Asia" program in the islands. Their small bands have distributed American propaganda right under the noses of high Jap officers, and kept up disruptive attacks on enemy supply lines.

Sgt. McCarry Dies; Clothier Is Recovering

News of the death of Sgt. William McCarry, serving with an ordnance division, in Alsace, France, came as a shock to his many friends here.

McCarry, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. McCarry of Chicago, was stationed in Torrance with the 13th Ordnance Group for more than 18 months prior to leaving for overseas duty last July. During that time he and his buddies were received into many Torrance homes and made many friendly contacts.

Sgt. Walter P. Clothier, serving with the same group was a victim of an unusual and painful accident recently when, holding a lighted match as he emerged from a pitch black barracks at night, he stepped into a container of gasoline and immediately became a human torch. Fortunately his men, standing nearby, were able to snuff out the flames and rushed him to a hospital where it was learned he had suffered third degree burns. In a letter to friends he told

of his orders to be sent to his home in Pennsylvania and of his plans to return to Torrance.
