Thomas Campbell, area director of the War Manpower Commission, issued an urgent appeal to men not now employed in essential industry to take jobs in local aluminum extrusion plants. He said that about 700 men would be needed between now and April 1, and about 1000 between now and June 1.

"Work in the aluminum industry is high-priority employment under the 'must' program of the War Manpower Commission," Campbell declared. "No previous experience is necessary.

"Beginners, however, are assured of interesting work of great value to the war program, in jobs offering steady employment with excellent opportunity for advancement."

Full particulars may be obtained at the nearest office of the United States Employment Service, the WMC director said.
