

Stambaugh Is Air Casualty, Parents Told

Details of the sacrifice of their son, Ensign George M. Stambaugh, USNR, were immediately given the parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. G. Stambaugh, 24717 Cypress st., Lomita, in a Navy communication informing them of his death. He was listed as missing in action following a plane crash March 5.

Ensign Stambaugh had been in the Navy since 1941 and before then was a naval ordnance inspector. He was a graduate of Rhode Island State College and received his commission June 24, 1944, at Concord, N. H. A pilot of fighter planes, he was on a mission over the Pacific when the fatal accident occurred.

Ensign Stambaugh recently met his brother, Edward, in the South Pacific. Thomas, another brother, is a private in the Army.

Kidnaped and Dumped Here, H.C. Boy Says

Juvenile officers this week were investigating the story told Monday night by 11-year-old Edward Shelton of 1634 West 254th st., Harbor City, that he was pulled into a car by two men and finally pushed out, other wise unharmed, into a mud puddle at Torrance park.

"I was walking along the sidewalk about a block from my house," Edward told police, "when a car drove up beside me and stopped, but the motor was still running. One man jumped out of the car, grabbed me by the arm and said:

"Come on, Bud, we're going for a ride."

The schoolboy said he struggled with the kidnapper but was dragged into the automobile. The car then sped away.

The two men drove to Westminster ave., then on to Pacific Coast Highway, turned on Oak st., in Lomita, then on Narbonne ave., and into Torrance, the boy said.

Here Are Rules For New Car Purchasers

Only the most essential workers can hereafter qualify as being eligible to purchase new 1942 automobiles, under OPA restrictions announced today by Paul Barksdale d'Orr, OPA district rationing executive.

To conserve the dwindling supply of new cars, the number of classifications of those eligible for purchase certificates was cut from 22 to 8, effective today. All of those removed from the previous eligible list will be eligible to purchase used 1942 cars.

"These restrictions are made necessary by the rapid dwindling away of our stockpile of new cars," d'Orr said. "The entire supply of new cars is now only 10,000. There are that many applications for new cars monthly. The national quota for February and March has been whittled to 2000 from the 3000 figure of five preceding months."

Groups retained on the new car-eligibility list are:

1. Government employees engaged in fire-fighting, crime detection, law enforcement, pertaining to public health and safety, transportation of mail.
2. Physicians, surgeons and midwives, who are governmentally licensed for necessary outside calls.
3. Farm veterinarians, licensed, serving agricultural establishments.
4. Public health nurses, but not private nurses, for necessary calls.
5. Ministers for serving regularly a locality.
6. Members of the armed forces for official business but not for transfer from post-to-post or

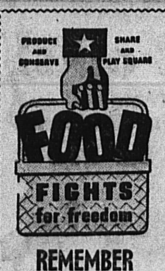
