The "freeze" imposed at the time of the German counter-offensive last December will not expire March 1 as originally planned, but will be extended an additional 90 days, according to Louis M. Dreves, WPB chief for Southern California.

Effect will be 'to permit new civilian production only in cases where a firm actually faces shutdown, or where military production chiefs wish to keep a plant's working force intact for future war work.

Simultaneously the WPB chief announced that only 42 out of a large number of applications were approved during February, under the new and drastic rules.
