George Smith City Pioneer, Dies at Age 81

Funeral services were conducted on Monday for George B. Smith, member of Torrance's fourth family, who died March 22, 1945, at a Gardena rest home.

With his son, Louis J. Smith, of 1754 Gramercy ave., he established the California Oil Tool Co., in Torrance, and in later years sold out to Marjory Tool & Die Co. He retired from active business life, and resided at his residence at 1976 W. Carson st. He was plant superintendent of Union Tool Co., now National Supply Co., from 1912 until 1924.

Born in Benango burrough, Penn., he was 81 years of age, and had been ill but for a short time.

In addition to the son, his widow, Mrs. Isabelle N. Smith, a brother, James Smith, of Pittsburgh, Penn., two granddaughters, Mrs. Helen M. Smith Whittier, and Mary Jane Casey, 1754 Gramercy ave., and two grandsons, Sgt. Geo. B. Smith, 8th Air Force, England, and Louis James Smith, of Torrance survive.

Services were conducted in Stone & Myers chapel, and interment was in Holy Cross cemetery. Pallbearers were: Dr. W. J. Neelands, George Probert, Robert Garbe, O. J. Batsch, William D. Dymond and Arthur Mullin.

Bomber Fleets Fill Skies, Pilot Reveals

Lt. James C. Williams, son of Everett E. Williams, of 313 E. 220th st., recently returned to his home in Portland, Ore., following nine months of piloting Flying Fortresses and Liberators over Germany for the 8th Air Force. In discussing the almost daily procession of allied warplanes over strategic targets of the Reich, he says: "I don't understand how the Germans can take it. It must be awful down below."

"On clear days sometimes one can look ahead and see as many as 500 planes, and then look behind and see as many more. They writhe and twist, like a giant serpent, avoiding the flak concentrations. It is an eerie sight, and down below the ground fairly trembles from the roaring of the massed planes even at great height."

Holder of the air medal with five oak leaf clusters and the presidential unit citation awarded his group, Lt. Williams had completed a total of 35 missions before he was ordered home on rotation leave. His father is a shipwright at Consolidated Wilmington Ship yards. His stepmother, Mrs. Mona Williams, is a real estate broker, with offices in Wilmington. With his wife Lt. Williams will visit here until he is re-assigned.

Regional Plan For District Is Approved

A comprehensive regional plan for the entire Gardena Valley will be prepared by the regional planning commission as a result of efforts of the Gardena Valley Chamber of Commerce.

The Los Angeles Board of Supervisors has approved the request of the Gardena Valley chamber and referred it to the commission for study and preparation of the development plan for the district, bounded by Imperial Highway on the north, 190th st. on the south, Avalon blvd. on the east, and Prairie ave. on the west.

The plan, to be worked out in cooperation with officials of the cities involved — Gardena, Torrance, Los Angeles, Hawthorne and Inglewood — and surrounding unincorporated territory, would include not only highway and street patterns, but locations for schools, parks, transportation facilities and general residential, commercial and industrial areas and necessary public service facilities.
