

Highway Patrol Will Cooperate In Brake Drive

All members of the California Highway Patrol will cooperate in a nationwide brake emphasis program beginning April 15 and ending June 1, Chief E. Raymond Cato announced today.

The program, sponsored by the International Association of Chiefs of Police, will focus attention of motorists on the importance to traffic safety of good brakes and good car condition. Chief Cato has been named coordinator of the program for California and will seek the assistance of all chiefs of police, sheriffs and other peace officers to make the program effective.

During the period of the program highway patrolmen and other police officers stopping a passenger car for any infraction of highway rules will take an additional sixty seconds to check the car's brakes, Cato said.

He explained that all officers will be provided with a small precision engineered wooden block which may be placed under the brake pedal. If the brake when depressed touches this wooden block, Cato said, it is engineering proof that the brakes will not stop the car in the number of feet required by California to prevent an accident. Warning tickets and educational pamphlets will be given to owners of all vehicles failing

to meet the tests but actual arrest citations will be issued only when further checks establish that the brakes are in need of repair.

Chief Cato said the program has the backing of all national and State safety groups and has been designed as one means of conserving the "rapid dwindling of motor vehicles."

Lt. Grant on Duty on Baby Flat-Top

His carrier has participated in two island invasions, the Leyte Gulf operations and the landings on Luzon. In the latter action his ship was part of the Support Carrier Force that ran the gauntlet of the Philippines, arriving off Lingayen Gulf three days ahead of the troops. Their mission in this engagement was to supply air cover for the bombarding vessels enroute to the objective and to soften up the beachheads by aerial bombardment prior to the actual landings. Following the landings they remained to furnish air support for the ground forces until strips could be prepared and land-based aircraft flown in to relieve them.

Forms for Vets Business Rations Available Here

Forms on which veterans of the present war may apply for rations needed in reestablishing themselves in small businesses will be available at local OPA boards on April 1.

This was announced by Frank W. Daniels, local board chief clerk.

Two types of business are thrown open to veterans by the new ration order. One type which uses rationed foods as raw materials, include bakeries, ice cream makers, soft drink bottlers and candy manufacturers. The other type used rationed foods in the service of "refreshments" includes cafes and eating stands serving such items as potato chips, popcorn, fruit and vegetable juices, ice cream or carbonated drinks.

Special rations are being made for honorably discharged veterans of the current war who do not have businesses and who intend to open and operate independent business.
