Bowron Re-elected Vote Light In Harbor District

Mayor Fletcher Bowron of Los Angeles appeared last night to have easily won re-election over his nearest opponent and former political backer, Clifford Clinton, and 11 other candidates.

George Moore, councilman whose district includes the shore string east of Torrance and Long Beach, appeared re-elected, but Roy J. Becker, Board of Education member of San Pedro, faced a runoff to retain his seat.

Los Angeles voters approved sewer bonds which it is promised, will take care of the ocean pollution situation off Venice and adjacent beaches, raised the salaries of the council from \$4800 to \$7200, the mayor to \$18,000 and granted several other increases.

The vote was extremely light in this area, particularly in the school board election in Torrance. It was a decided "yes" attitude which greeted election officials of Los Angeles Tuesday, all propositions receiving substantial majorities, as based on the count last night.

Local Soldier Wounded In German Battle

Struck by fragments of an enemy mine during an American attack on the town of St. Vith, Belgium, Tech. Sgt. Elvin H. Saxberg, 28, of 1450 220th st., Torrance, formerly of Holt, Minn., is now recovering from wounds of both lower legs, left hip and left elbow at the 159th United States Army general hospital in England. He has been awarded the Purple Heart.

"His condition has shown considerable improvement but he will require further treatment," said his ward surgeon, Capt. Vincent R. Tokar of Passaic, N.J.

Platoon sergeant in an armored infantry battalion, Sgt. Saxberg said the enemy had laid down a heavy barrage of artillery, mortar and small arms fire in a determined effort to hold the town.

"We were advancing across a field when one of my boys stepped on a German shoe mine," he explained. "He was killed instantly, and several fragments struck me, breaking the bones in my lower legs."

Received emergency treatment within 30 minutes, but the roads were so heavily mined I was not evacuated until about 17 hours later. I returned to England on a hospital ship."

Lt. M. J. Loftus Attached To 467th Liberator Group

Second Lt. Marshall J. Loftus of 1812 W. 218th st., Torrance, recently joined Col. Albert J. Shower's 467th Bomb Group to fly and fight as navigator on a B-24 Liberator bomber at an Eighth Air Force Liberator station in England.

After completing an operational training course, Lt. Loftus will be assigned to fly on bombing missions to Germany and enemy-occupied Europe. Hoping him on these missions will be the experience this Eighth Air Force group has gained from dispatching its heavy bombers on more than 190 bombing attacks on enemy targets during the past 11 months.

The 467th Bomb Group is part of Maj. Gen. William E. Kepner's Second Air Division.

A graduate of Torrance high school, Lt. Loftus was a laboratory assistant for the Alumnus Co. of America prior to entering military service, Aug. 13, 1943. Recently stationed at Pueblo, Colo., Army Air Base, he was assigned to combat duty in the European theatre of operations in February, 1945.

His father, John J. Loftus, lives at the above Torrance address.
