Zamperini Air Field Value Is Revealed

Zamperini Airport, on 101 Highway in Torrance, now is a Class 3 Army Airport, and it is the only community air field within a radius of 10 miles which is free from airway traffic, thus permitting its operation after the war.

This statement was made at the Lions club luncheon on Tuesday noon in Civic Auditorium by Lieut. Harold Holmes, commanding the Civil Air Patrol squadron at the airport. He said that because the Torrance airport does not interfere with airway traffic at Mines Field and other fields, and because a tremendous sum of money has been spent there, every effort should be made to retain the airport after the war. He stressed the CAP program as one which will assure its continuance by the government or the community at the end of the war. He further declared that it is the only Army air field in the nation on which the CAP is permitted to operate now.

Flight Officer Janet McCoy also spoke, giving the history of CAP. It was pointed out that there are now 467 youths and adults training under the CAP at the Torrance Field. The CAP is an auxiliary of the Army Air Force to train a reservoir of pilots and maintenance men for future military or civil aviation. The youths are from 15 to 18

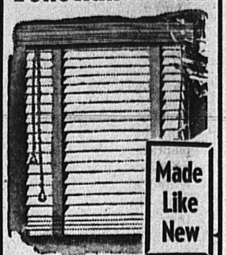
