Alondra Park

One of the legal barriers confronting the development of Alondra Park is the inability of this county under the present law to widen the streets surrounding the parksite. This is due to the fact that there is no provision in the law whereby any portion of any county park may be acquired for highway purposes. Before adequate access to Alondra Park can be secured, a provision must be enacted into the state law allowing the county to so-acquire such portion of the park for highway widening use.

Assemblyman Glenn M. Anderson, at the request of the county to So-acquire such some control of the county of Los Angeles has introduced such a measure, Assembly Bill No. 2146, which is now pending before the committee on municipal and county government in the state legislature. The bill provides that the county by a four-fifths vote of the Board of Supervisors, may dedicate for highway purposes any portion of any county park that has been acquired in whole or in part with county funds.
