He wears the Purple Heart for wounds received in action.

A graduate of Narbonne High school, Sgt. Likens was a machinist for the Los Angeles Shipbuilding Company at San Pedro Harbor before entering the Army August 3, 1943.

Sgt. Williams Overseas for More Than Year

Sgt. Charles E. Williams of 2218-A Cabrillo ave., Torrance, is now entitled to wear two gold overseas stripes as he has been serving overseas for more than a year.

Sgt. Williams is an airplane engine mechanic in a 15th air force B-24 Liberator bomb group that has completed more than 175 bombing missions against the enemy and has been awarded the distinguished unit citation.

CITY PLANS TO DEDICATE MEMORIAL PLOT IN PARK TO BE AIRED AT MEETING

That the City of Torrance will dedicate a portion of El Prado park, at Cravens ave., to the memory of veterans of all wars who have made the supreme sacrifice for their country was indicated Tuesday night by the City Council. Following the reading of a resolution from Bert S. Crossland Post No. 170, American Legion, and Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 3251, the council set Wednesday, May 2, as the date for a meeting to decide the boundaries and other data necessary to dedication of the memorial plot.

Veterans Aid Explained to Torrance Club

Veterans of Torrance area may have service of accredited agencies either in Torrance or in Los Angeles, in securing jobs, pensions, housing, business loans and other allowances under the G. I. bill of rights, according to information given to Torrance Lions Club at its meeting Tuesday noon in Civic Auditorium.

With representatives of various veterans organizations present, Robert Craig, of the Veterans Service Center, Los Angeles, spoke under the auspices of the war chest, outlining the work being done for the veterans. "The big job is still ahead of us," he remarked, "and what we are doing now can merely be considered preparation for the return of the millions of men now overseas."

J. G. Caldwell, secretary of the Torrance Veterans Service committee, was in attendance, and said that the every need of service men can be handled in Torrance, either at the Selective Service board or at the United States Employment Service office. K. E. Bradley, manager of USES also was a guest, and declared his unit is prepared for all veterans service.

Also present and taking part in an informal conversation was Commander C. Earl Conner, of the local Veterans of Foreign Wars Post, representing Rotary Club of Torrance at the meeting were Hillman R. Lee, J. L. Lynch and J. E. McMaster, while Kiwanis Club was represented by Ryan Daggett, president, and H. Wesley Roloff, pastor of Evangelical Guild Church.

The Lions Club presented Father Wood of St. Joseph's church, in the Pueblo, with a check for \$100 to apply toward the recreation development there.

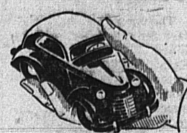
