Citing Section 6107 of the Government Code, Jordan said:
"Neither the State nor any public officer or body acting in his official capacity on behalf of the State, any county, or city, indicated and or receive any fee or compensation for recording or indexing any discharge of a solder, sailor, marine or a nurse; issuing certified copies of such discharges; any service whatever rendered in the matter of a pension claim, application, affi-davit, voucher, or any claim to be presented to the Administrat for Service in the Army, Navy, tor Marine Corps."
