

County Plans For World Fair Are Studied

Appointment of a special committee to undertake a study of the general subject of a centennial exposition for Los Angeles County was announced yesterday by LeRoy M. Edwards, president of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce.

Clarence S. Bessemeyer, vice president of the chamber has been named chairman of the group.

Under instructions from the chamber's board of directors, the committee is charged with the following tasks:

- 1.-To determine the desirability of holding an exposition.
- 2.-To find out what value such an event would be to the county.
- 3.-To report on the cost of financing the proposed enterprise.
- 4.-To recommend what roles the business community should or should not play in promoting the exposition.

President Edwards of the chamber emphasized in his announcement that the committee is not empowered to recommend action by the board of directors, but will function solely as a fact-finding group for submission of data to the board.

This committee is composed of eight directors and one other member of the chamber, with representatives from the retail, wholesale, industrial and financial fields of business.

Vets Entitled To Notary Service Without Fees

War veterans are exempt from payment of numerous fees in connection with the notarizing of documents and also with the certifying of certain legal records, it was announced today by Frank M. Jordan, Secretary of State.

Citing Section 6107 of the Government Code, Jordan said: "Neither the State nor any county, or city, nor any public officer or body acting in his official capacity on behalf of the State, any county, or city, including notaries public, shall demand or receive any fee or compensation for recording or indexing any discharge of a soldier, sailor, marine or a nurse; issuing certified copies of such discharges; any service whatever rendered in the matter of a pension claim, application, affidavit, voucher, or any claim to be presented to the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs under

His buddy, Ray Pennington, who made his home with the Sullivan family, made the supreme sacrifice on Pearl Harbor Day.

An excerpt from a note to his mother, written after he was wounded, follows:

"I guess I will be out of the hospital soon. They are going to take an X-Ray of my head this afternoon to make sure I have no more shrapnel in it. Whatever you do, dear, don't worry about me as I'll be all right. Today is my 24th birthday. I hope to be home soon. I have a hunch around June."

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Merchant Marine Cadet Exams Are Being Given Again

The training organization of the War Shipping Administration announces examinations to be held during 1945 on the last Saturday of May, September, November and on the last Wednesday in July, for appointment as cadet-midshipman in the U. S. Merchant Marine Cadet Corps and its academy at Kings Point. Applications forms and information booklets may be obtained by writing to the supervisor, U. S. Merchant Marine Cadet Corps, training organization War Shipping Administration, National Theatre building, Washington 25, D. C.

Competitive examinations are conducted by the U. S. Civil Service Commission and are based upon high school courses in English, mathematics, physics, modern history, and primarily upon the general knowledge which a young man should acquire in attaining the minimum requisite of 15 high school credits.

State quota based upon the population of each state will be observed in selecting candidates for appointment in the order of highest grades received in the entrance examinations. Candidates who are unmarried citizens and who are 18 years and 6 months of age and not yet 23 may submit application for appointment as cadet-midshipman deck or cadet-midshipman engineer. The number of engineer appointments are normally about 50 per cent greater than the number of deck appointments.

Physical qualifications are based upon the requirements of the Navy department for appointment as midshipman in the U. S. Naval Reserve and are the same for deck or engineer candidates. No candidate will be appointed who fails to meet with these rigid physical requirements regardless of the grade achieved in a competitive scholastic examination.

New Salvage Head of WPB

Zack J. Farmer, for two years head of the War Production Board's general salvage division in Southern California, has left WPB to return to private business.

Operations of the WPB program, coordinating with some 280 volunteer salvage committees in as many Southland communities, will continue with undiminished vigor, according to WPB chief Louis M. Dreyfus, who named Edward B. Zane as head of all WPB salvage activities.

Zane for more than two years has headed the WPB industrial salvage division, which works with local war plants in salvaging waste critical materials.

Two Residents Contribute to Foster Plan

Two residents of the Torrance area have contributed toward the support of children of United Nations in Europe through the Foster Parents' Plan for War Children, for the month of April, it was announced yesterday by Mrs. Edna Blue, Plan executive chairman. American headquarters of the Plan are at 55 West 42nd st., New York City.

The Plan operates fifty-three children's projects in France, England, Italy and Malta and is caring for Maltese, British, French, Italian, Spanish, Czech, Dutch, Polish, Belgian, Austrian, Norwegian, Hungarian, Danish and German children. The local contributors are: Miss Bettie Schults, 1803 An-

dreo ave., and Mrs. E. Curry, Foster Parent Secretary, of Chadwick School, Rolling Hills. The projects which the Plan operates in England, Italy, France and Malta include the following: The Hampstead Nurseries directed by Miss Anna Freud and Mrs. Dorothy Tiffany Burlingham; The J. B. Priestley Nurseries, Herefordshire; The Liberation Colony, Normandy, France; The Westfield Colony; The Grange; The Malta Colony, Silema, Malta and the Rome and Naples Colonies in Italy.

On the receipt of an application by the Foster Parents' Plan the foster parent receives as soon as possible, a photograph and a brief history of the child and pays \$15 per month for the support of the child.
