

Dr. Swartout Discusses Fever In Article

Normal temperature taken by mouth is approximately 98.6 degrees, and the rectal temperature is usually about 1 degree higher. Nearly everyone's temperature varies a little during the day, lower in the morning than in the evening.

When a temperature goes above its normal level fever exists and is the natural reaction of the body to tissue damage or invasion of germs. Through fever the body speeds up its reactions against such damage or infection, and in itself does no considerable harm when below 103.0 degrees. Fever above this point can harm the nervous system, and the rapid pulse rate which usually accompanies high fever can result in heart injury.

If perspiration is present, its evaporation cools the body. Sometimes sweating can be artificially induced. Spenging the skin with alcohol or lukewarm water to effect evaporation is also effective. In relieving the headache usually present with fever, cold applications to the forehead and temples are of value and also help to reduce temperature.

Especially if the sick person is a child, lukewarm or moderately cool enemata given slowly will remove much heat from the body. A good enema solution is a teaspoonful of salt to a quart of water. Two quarts of such solution can be used every two or three hours.

Fever is a warning signal. To detect it, every family should have a thermometer, know how and when to use it. A fever which persists for more than a day or two despite home treatments or which is difficult to reduce below 103.0 most certainly calls for a physician's attention.

More Power Is Given Supervisors To Install Sewers

Information has been received by Supervisor Raymond V. Darby that Assembly Bill No. 239 has been passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor, to become immediately effective.

This will ease the statutory requirements in connection with the construction of sewers in county areas, by permitting the Board of Supervisors by a four-fifths vote to override a majority protest in cases where sewer construction is declared a health measure by the County Health Officer. Heretofore many vital sewer construction projects have been held up by fee owners, when purchasers on contract

Fats Collection Falls Off After Red Point Jump

Collections of waste fats from Southern California homes declined substantially in April despite the fact that the need is greater than ever, Edward B. Zane, WPB District Salvage Chief, declared today.

Reports from the renderers who process the grease turned in by local butchers showed 720,569 pounds were gathered by Southland housewives in April, as compared with 810,107 pounds in March, according to Zane.

Torrance's contribution was 2151 pounds. "Recent boosting of red point values of fats and oils simply reflects the growing shortage of these important raw materials," the WPB salvage chief pointed out.

"Military and industrial requirements are now running more than two and a half times the 1940 needs, yet the supply this year is going to fall below last year's record total. "There is only one place to turn for this extra production, and that is the waste fats which now go down the sink in many households.

March tax returns show distribution of 147,078,865 gallons of gasoline on which a tax of \$4,412,218 was assessed. The March, 1945, tax returns show an increase of 12.9 per cent over those of February, 1945.

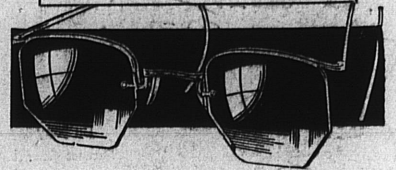
