★ JOHN FESS JR.
Fireman 1/c, U.S.N.
John Fess, Jr., son of Mr. and
Mrs. John Fess of 1729 Arlington ave, was killed in action
December 7, 1941, at Pearl Harbor. He was the first serviceman from Torrance to be killed
in the World War II. His brother, Lleut. Kenneth B. Fess, A.
F., also survives him. He
was born in Torrance and was
graduated in the winter class
of '83.

Floyd Ramsey, son of Mr. and
