Last year's campaign told in feature style the story of a "playground at war." It was based on intensive research into how the area's individual resources have been thrown into the nation's drive to win the war.

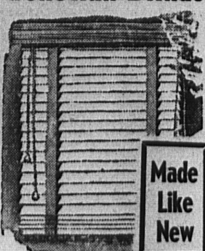
Each printed message emphasized that while Southern California was too busy to welcome tourists, its varied and individual assets are still here and will be enjoyed again when victory is a reality.
