Torrance Man Injured in Harbor Blast

One man was killed and nine others including a Torrance man injured when seven carbon dioxide containers were accidentally discharged in the hold of a transport undergoing repairs at the Todd Shipyards Corp. at Los Angeles Harbor Sunday. Approximately 674,000 cubic feet of gas escaped into the hold where the men were working.

Fatally injured was Francisco Obregon, 41, of 1227 N. Main st., Ernest Cope, 41, of 304 S. Francisco st., Redondo Beach, receiving fractures of both wrists and multiple bruises when a rope down which he was sliding to aid his fellow-workers broke, dropping him 20 feet.

Council Absent
Commander Conner called for members of the City Council to come to the platform for official dedication of the plot of land to the memory of departed comrades, but in the absence of all of them, called upon City Clerk A. H. Bartlett who read the official resolution dedicating the land.

Resolution No. 1721, adopted May 2, 1945, the document read as follows:

"Whereas, The City Council of the City of Torrance has received a resolution signed by Lester C. Fix as commander of Bert S. Crossland Post No. 170, American Legion, by Charles E. Conner as commander of Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 3251, and by Thomas T. Babbitt as adjutant of Bert S. Crossland Post No. 170, American Legion and George T. Spaulding, adjutant of Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 3251, which resolution reads in part as follows: "Inasmuch as a state of war exists in which millions of our men and women are serving in the Armed Forces of our country and many of whom have made the supreme sacrifice, and

Whereas, Many communities have erected and dedicated in memory of those departed comrades certain memorials, and Whereas, It has been noted that some thought has been expressed in this community relative to a veterans' memorial, and

Whereas, The members of Bert S. Crossland Post No. 170, American Legion, and Torrance Post No. 3251, Veterans of Foreign Wars, in joint action do hereby request your honorable body to set aside a certain portion of El Prado Park, namely the easterly 100 feet of said park facing Cravens ave, for memorial purposes," and

Whereas, The City Council of the City of Torrance is in accord with the expressions contained in said resolution.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved that a portion of El Prado Park, namely the easterly 100 feet thereof, be and the same is hereby dedicated for annual Memorial purposes to be used by all patriotic organizations.

Be It Further Resolved, That this resolution be signed by the mayor, attested by the city clerk and a copy sent to Lester C. Fix, commander of Bert S. Crossland Post No. 170, American Legion and to Charles E. Conner, commander of Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 3251.

Introduced and adopted this second day of May, 1945.

Other features of the ceremony at El Prado Park memorial plot were the pledge to the Flag lead by Neil Silence, Boy Scout Troop 241; "America" by the State Guard band; the invocation by Father McGuinness; closing prayer by the Rev. Paul Moore Wheeler, and playing of the Star Spangled Banner by the band.

James G. Caldwell, local veterans service leader, read the roll call of the departed comrades, after which a firing party of the State Guard fired three volleys in their honor, and a bugler rendered "Taps."

Quarantine Of Dogs Voted By Gardena

Because of the danger of a rabies epidemic the Gardena Council at its meeting May 21 adopted a drastic dog quarantine resolution which requires all dog owners to confine their pets to their own premises for a period of 90 days starting May 21. The quarantine was decided upon as the result of a report from the county health department.

Dr. Henry Smiley, head of the county health department at Torrance, told the council that 10 rabid dogs had been found in or near the City of Gardena in the past month and that several people are now under treatment for fear they may have contracted the disease which

can prove fatal if not promptly treated.

The dog quarantine carries heavy penalties for its violation and owners may be haled into court. Maximum penalty provided

by the city ordinance is \$300 fine and 90 days in jail.
