Telescope of Gun Aids Torrance Man and Crew to Blast Japs on Luzon

That a 12-power telescope at 2000 yards or less, will pick out enough of a target to start a "DeMille" production, was proven by Pfc. Charles W. Carlton Jr. of Torrance, Calif., Cpl. James D. Phelan of 300 S. Roosevelt ave., Cherokee, Iowa; Cpl. Maurice D. Landis, 6744 Ridgeland ave., Chicago, Ill. While at a forward observation post for the first platoon of the 136th Infantry Cannon Co., a part of the 33d Division on Luzon which lacked the comfort and security of the Carlton residence at Torrance, the men found themselves looking down the muzzle of a Japanese field piece which was firing on the third battalion of the 136th infantry thus holding up their advance, and causing serious trouble. Prompt clearance from the third battalion headquarters assured the gun crew resulted in immediate counter fire, thus instantly silencing the Jap weapon.

Not satisfied, the Japanese started reinforcing this position. Waiting for the Nips to finish moving in, so that they could really disrupt the Japs situation, Phelan thru the "scope" dreamed of his home in good old Iowa. Still waiting for the Japs to settle in the position, the F.O. party received a request from I Company to fire on a Jap machine gun position. With indirect fire through I Company's control the target was located and blown higher than a kite.

It was not long after this before the University of Illinois boy, leaving his "scope," jumped into action, calling for fire to be placed at a range of 1800 yards on what was estimated to be a company of Japs boldly digging in on the spot near where formerly the gun had been situated. After firing, Landis from Chicago, Ill., looking through the eye-piece counted a total of 25 Japs dead and esti-
