\$250,000 FOR BEACHES

Creason Task Aids Movement Of War Supplies

Staff Sgt. Benjamin F. Creason, has been reported by the first base air depot, Warrington, England, as being one of the crack Air Service Command team who pitched in to back up the air assaults that helped knock Germany out of the war. On V-E Day, he was helping to ready more combat planes and equipment for immediate action wherever they might be needed.

Of the base air depot area, Brig. Gen. Morris Berman, commanding general of that area declared: "These soldiers have, since their work began, dispatched 415,000 tons of Air Corps supplies, assembled and modified 12,000 combat planes, and repaired or overhauled more than 30,000 aircraft engines."

Sergeant Creason has been overseas since August, 1943, and joined the Army in June, 1943. He was employed by the Columbia Steel Company of Torrance, and his wife, Bernice Creason, resides at 1418 W. 183rd st.

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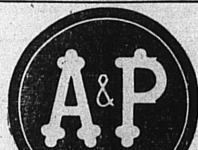
