Operating in close support of

Bad Wound Is
Suffered by
Lt. G. W. Nelson

First Lieut. Gordon W. Nelson
of the 96th Division, Tenth Army,
has been reported wounded while
participating in the Battle of
Okinawa. He was wounded April
6, 1945, and is hospitalized at
Saipan, where he is awaiting
transportation to United States.
Nelson had seen action on
Leyte when he landed with the
First Infantry on that island.
He served through the entire
engagement there. Then he went
with the 96th to Okinawa where,
after participating in several
battles, he was seriously wound-
ed.

He received his officer's training
at Ft. Benning, Ga., and in-
telligence schooling in Maryland.

His sister, Mrs. W. W. Holm,
resides at 1731 Cabrillo ave.,
Torrance.

In a letter received by his
father, Nelson related many of
the "blow-by-blow" incidents
he experienced during the op-
eration that took place on Leyte.

He said that "on 7 o'clock,
10 o'clock Friday morning, Octo-
ber 20, the assault wave of
which this outfit was a part,
hit the beach. At 10:52 the
American flag was raised for
the first time in over two years."

It was on the third day that
the battle really began for Nel-
son and his outfit as they were
trapped and fired upon by a
large Jap force dug in on a cer-
tain undisclosed hill where the
Nips had an ideal position. Here
they stayed for the next seven
days, practically pinned down.
After careful estimate of the
situation, the unit was ordered
to "take the hill." It was quite
a happy surprise when the out-
fit did finally take the hill to
find the remaining live Japs
had moved out.

Of the natives, Nelson had this
to say: "In summing up the
Filipinos, don't ever sell him
short. He is a clean, intelligent,
devoted and a furious fighter.
He loves his home, his land and
his own rights just as we do,
and is perfectly willing to give
his life for such without batting
an eye. Very interesting, believe
me."
