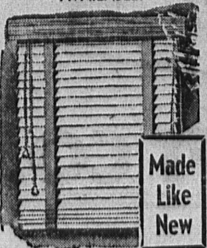

Palmer Nelson Busy Refilling Big Bombers

If the days when he told gas station attendants to "fill 'er up" seem pretty remote to Pte. Palmer O. Nelson, 26, of Torrance, it's probably due to his fast-paced work as refueling technician with a squadron of Seventh AAF Liberator bombers in the Palau.

Private Nelson does the filling these days. The fuel he uses is 100-octane aviation gasoline. Instead of his favorite convertible, his charges are ten thirsty Liberator bombers, carrying more than 2000 gallons of fuel each on his squadron's record missions against enemy bases.

Thirty minutes are required for filling each bomber. During this period, Private Nelson must employ every one of a series of special refueling techniques to neutralize the danger of fire. He watches the hoses running from his 4000-gallon tank truck for signs of leaks. The truck itself must be handled with extra skill

to forestall sparks.

The technical difficulties of Private Nelson's job are increased by excessive heat. His truck must be kept completely filled or completely empty at all times to prevent his base's high temperatures from creating an explosive gas in unfilled space between the fluid level and the top of the tank.

Private Nelson wears the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with three battle stars for participating in the reconquest of the Philippines and the Mandated Islands. He entered the Pacific theater a year ago. His wife, the former Jane Crawford, lives at 2213 Cambridge ave., Torrance. His mother, Mrs. Lillie Nelson, is a resident of Portland, N. D. Employee of the National Supply Company, Torrance, before entering the Army, he attended schools in Portland.
