Shoes, ration-free and at prices 25 percent under those for which they were offered on June 1, are in store for Southern California consumers during a 3-week period from July 9 to 28, OPA announced today.

Footwear to be offered will consist of odds and ends and broken sizes for both men and women—stock that accumulates after every selling season and which, in normal times, is disposed of through clearance sales.

Dealers are being requested to limit sales of these shoes to one pair to each customer in order that more consumers be given an opportunity to share in the limited stock available.

Torrance Far Short of 7th War Loan Quota

As the day for the end of the Seventh War Loan drive approaches, it appeared that the campaign was falling far short of previous records accomplished in Torrance.

The figures of four major issuing agencies in Torrance indicated that a total of \$496,861.50 in Seventh War Loan bonds had been sold in Torrance, against the total quota of \$850,000.

Lt. V Newman Home After 100 "Hump" Hops

After 100 flights over the "hump" on the India-China route Lt. Virgil Newman, 1221 225th st., is home proudly wearing the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters, and two Bronze Stars, but his chest expanded most by the meeting of his six months' old daughter, Terry Jean.

The lieutenant went overseas with the Air Transport Command more than a year ago, and piloted a C-46 hauling vital supplies and passengers over the dangerous route which supplied China while the Burma road was in the hands of the Japs.

Lieutenant Newman was employed at Newberry's before entering the service, and reports to Long Beach air base after a visit with Mrs. Newman and their daughter.

The air medal and cluster awards were made upon completion of 450 hours of operational flight in transport aircraft over the dangerous and difficult India-China air routes, where enemy interception and attack was probable and expected.

The air trail over the Hump, famed route through the towering peaks of the Himalaya Mountains, blazed by the Air Transport Command, is recognized by airmen as the world's toughest. Today the Hump route is the main lifeline of vital military supplies for the Allied forces fighting the Japanese in China.

The citation accompanying the award reads:

"Flying at night as well as by day, at high altitudes over impassable, mountainous terrain through areas characterized by extremely treacherous weather conditions necessitating long periods of operation on instruments... requiring courageous and superior performance of his duties to overcome, he accomplished his mission with distinction..."
