decks leading to the ships en-gine room, where it killed three of the crew. Two oil storage tanks, each containing 1000 gallens of oil, were fired by the blast. The tanks then exploded and their flames set fire to the transport below decks. Twisted steel doors and water-tight builkheads sealed some wounded fighters from would-be reseuers. Their charred bodies were later found piled before the compartment doors attesting to their frantile efforts to escape the raging inferno. Besides disabiling the ship's power system, the bomb dam-aged enough vital pressure mech-anism to prevent ship's fire fighters from getting any pres-sure in the water lines, Auxil-iary pressure methods were em-ployed by utting the fire mains over the side from small boats. Most of the Pinkney's comple-ment was attending a movie when the attack occurred. The movie was eredited with saving many lives.
