

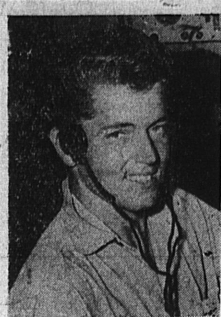
Harry B. Lewis Compton Vets' Service Director

Harry B. Lewis, president of Torrance Lions Club who resigned as executive secretary of Torrance Chamber of Commerce on June 9, Monday took over his new duties as director of the Veterans Service Center at Compton, a War Chest agency.

In his new assignment, he is working with a board of 17 Compton business, civic, fraternal, religious and community leaders in handling the affairs and problems of the returned veterans of Compton and the surrounding area.

Himself a veteran, an Air Corps captain seeing action with United States and Royal Air forces in Europe in World War I and placed on the reserve list as a major, Lewis was selected from a large field of applicants for the position, it was said.

He will maintain his residence with his family in Torrance, Lewis said, and will continue his affiliation with the World Fairfleet plan for a floating ex-

position to visit foreign ports, initiated by Edsel Newton, Long Beach and Torrance newsman, and with Post No. 3251, Veterans of Foreign Wars, in its campaign to raise funds to finance the remodeling of the old Ford building, Torrance eye-sore since 1942, into a modern Veterans Hall.

Rowland in Gun Crew in Fast Carrier Force

Walter M. Rowland, 27, seaman, first class, USN, whose wife, Mrs. Lois Rowland, and three children, live in Torrance, served in a gun crew that helped repel a Jap air raid on a fast carrier task force near Kyushu, southernmost off the Jap main islands, sharing in the credit for two of four enemy planes shot down and an assist for the other two.

Not long after our own planes had taken off for a strike against Kyushu, the first Jap plane appeared, screened by cloud cover. Shells from 20-mm. and 40-mm. guns sent the Jap splashing toward the sea.

Another Jap plane which appeared then was broken in two by heavy antiaircraft fire, dropping into the sea, where its bomb exploded harmlessly. Next three Jap planes came in, singly and minutes apart.

Each time Jap guns turned loose, a Jap plane tumbled down. One of them, fully afire, narrowly missed the fantail of this carrier in its plunge to the sea.

Rowland, who does radar work at his battle station, has fire control as his regular job aboard his ship. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Rowland, live at 1522 W. 213th st., Torrance.

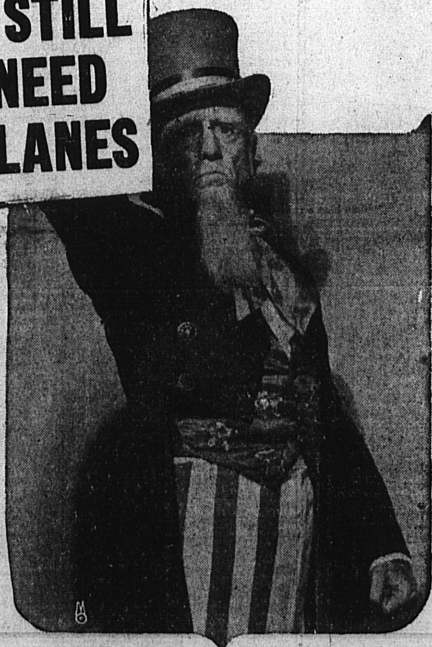

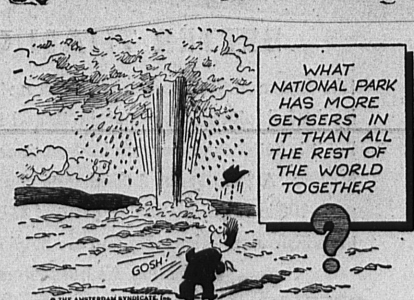

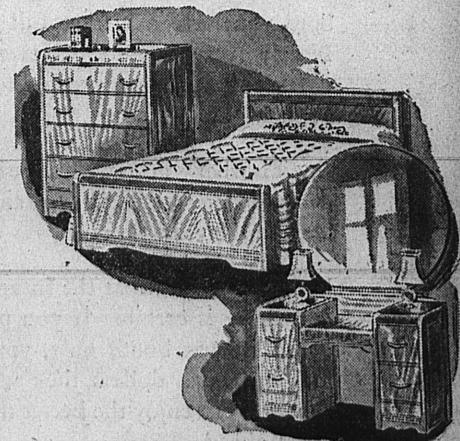
